October first was a commemorative day with several firsts; our first Hort meeting, our first Provisional talk and our first Fragrance Garden dedication! We were horticulturally informed thanks to our Hort Chairs with their bulb planting demo and Latin lesson. Kudos to Mary Jo Bench not only for being first among the Provisionals to speak, but for educating us about the Freeman Medal plants. Now we know why *Pycnanthemum muticum*, Mountain Mint, was a winner! If I had a deer problem, this would be the perfect solution!`

Ten volunteers made for light work, deadheading, weeding, raking and scrubbing benches in the Fragrance Garden in preparation for our rose arbor dedication. The rose arbor came to fruition after many years of discussion

with the Curation Committee. It was the brain child of Diana Neely who advocated for it over several years. This goal was realized last year during her presidency. Hotie Hard suggested a powder-coated iron material that the Seattle Iron Works Company made that will withstand our soggy climate. Ana Hergert found a design that was agreed upon by all parties. It culminated in a successful collaboration with CUH, funded by Community Projects. A fragrant climber, *Rosa* 'Colette', is planted in each corner.

We are eagerly looking forward to our general meeting October 18th when Julie Ubigau will speak to us about the Conservation Canine program from the UW. A few of us were inspired by a demonstration we witnessed in Omaha, Neb., last fall at the Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference. Working Dogs, from Missoula, Mont. performed trained exercises to sniff out invasive plants. We are delighted that such a program exists in Seattle! Our general meeting, **November 15**, will feature Anne Scott, who will demonstrate the beauty of designing floral jewelry. We are looking forward to learning about this artistic skill.

Sadly, Ginny (Virginia) Kitchell passed away in September, after a stroke. Ginny was a member of the SGC for over forty-five years, receiving the distinguished title of Honorary Life Member. We learned from Peggy-Paige Most that Ginny served as the first Conservation Chair!

We're counting down to our Christmas luncheon and auction **December 6**. Have you considered a creative experience or special item to donate? This annual event allows us to generously give to community projects throughout the region. It's a festive occasion to bring guests as well!



ARBOR APPLAUSE


The New SGC Arbor was dedicated and celebrated in early October, following the Horticulture Meeting.

Cheers to fresh continual fragrances in our CUH garden!





Reports

Founders Fund Update

Last February, club members approved further exploration of three initial ideas for a Founders Fund project, focusing in Southeast Seattle, the Duwamish and the Arboretum. Follow-up investigation revealed little immediate potential for a project in Rainier Beach where SGC contributed to establishment of the urban farm. And while the Duwamish is a hotbed of activity with great potential for meaningful engagement, SGC has no track record of involvement. A key criterion for Founders Fund judging is "the degree of the club's involvement – money, time, skill and ongoing oversight,



representation on the Board of the project." By that standard neither is currently a promising fit for a competitive Founders Fund project.

We are thus looking closely at developing a project in the Arboretum that builds on our historic and recent Centennial Garden investments. We should hear from UW Botanical Garden leadership shortly about a specific opportunity taking shape that could "fire on all cylinders." SGC can play a pivotal role in helping address the degradation plaguing the Olmsteddesigned Woodland Garden watershed, engaging children and providing opportunities for hands-on involvement and collaboration. Stay tuned!


Photography Report 3rd Annual Photo Critique

Nature's Poetry—a GCA Flower Show!

HAVE YOU REGISTERED FOR "NATURE'S POETRY," SGC'S 2019 FLOWER SHOW?

Registration for our upcoming flower show opened to SGC members on October 15th. It will open to all GCA beginning December 15th, so ideally, you should register before others are given the opportunity. To register, simply email the appropriate division registrar with your desired Class number, title, and your name. She will follow up by confirming your entry, or letting you know if the Class is full.

Here are some registration FAQs:

- Every SGC member is entitled to register for any of the listed classes and are encouraged to participate, including Provisionals
- You may register for any discipline: Photography, Floral Design, Horticulture in fact, it is possible to register for something in all three disciplines, regardless of which committees you are on
- Conservation is an "exhibit only" discipline; your participation in helping with the display is welcome. Contact Shelley Rolfe or Carolyn Kitchell
- No need for last minute pressure: Photography, all entries, and Horticulture container entries, Classes 9 to 12, are either required to be completed well in advance or can be done well in advance and then delivered as indicated in the Guidelines
- Do you prefer to wake up, look in your garden, cut your specimens and enter then Horticulture, Classes 1-7, Cut Specimens, are for you and require no early registration

<u>Following is the schedule of all those requiring early registration.</u> Please refer to the entire schedule and all Guidelines on our SGC web site.

DIVISION I: Floral Design Classes

Class 1: SONNET Four Entries

A miniature arrangement of fresh plant material. To be staged on a 6" black base, set on a plank 52" above the floor. Viewed from the front. The base and plank will be provided to exhibitors at the show; color and specific information will be shared in advance by the Class Consultant.

Class 2: HAIKU Four Entries

A modern line design displayed in a lighted, black niche with the interior measurements of 20" wide x 20" deep x 30" high. The base height of the niche is 42" above the floor. Exhibitor may provide a removable liner, but the surface of the niche may not be damaged. To be viewed from the front. Modern line design: uses a minimum of plant material with emphasis on contrast in form and texture. There may be more than one point of emergence for plant material.

Class 3: PASTORAL Four Entries

A Pot-et-fleur arrangement depicting a pastoral scene, collaboratively designed by two GCA members, one skilled in horticulture and the other in floral design. There are no ownership requirements. Viewed from 3 sides. To be staged on a pedestal 40" in height and 20" square. The pedestal may not be draped or enlarged, and the design may extend no more than 6" on either side or back of the pedestal, and no more than 6" in the front. A key card is required.

A. A collection of five different specimens no higher than 6" above the rim.

B. A collection of five different specimens no higher than 12" above the rim.

CLASSES 9-11 CONTAINER-GROWN PLANTS Pre-Registration Required Three-month Ownership

Class 9 EPIC Hypertufa

Hypertufa container, made by exhibitor and can be carried by exhibitor; may not include ferns. Key card required.

A. A single plant. Six Entries

B. A multiple of culturally compatible plants.

Class 10 LYRIC All in the Family Six Entries

A collection of three or more different rooted species or cultivars from the same family.

The container of exhibitor's choice is not to exceed 14". Key card required.

Class 11 RHYTHM Ferns

Specific containers are required to be purchased through the division chairs

A. A small "log" container planted only with two or more ferns, same or different cultivars. Specific containers are required to be purchased through the division chairs. Key card required. Six Entries

B. A fern or ferns accompanied by at least two compatible plants. Fern(s) must dominate. Six Entries

DIVISION III: PHOTOGRAPHY CLASSES

Class 1 PANEGYRIC Color / Novice Only Six Entries

A timeless landscape that depicts the beauty and essence of a particular season.

Class 2 ECLOGUE Color Six Entries

An image that explores the interaction of humans or wildlife with nature. Depiction of people, if any, must be a subordinate element in the composition.

Class 3 ELEGY Monochrome Six Entries

An image that depicts the transitory cycle of life and the inevitability of decay in nature.

Class 4 SONNET Color Six Entries

A water image that delineates patterns, lines or reflections in nature. Plant material not required.

Class 5 HAIKU Color Close-up Six Entries

A triptych with three close-up images that reflect the unfolding and blossoming of a flower. A written haiku of the entrant's choosing must be included in or layered on the images.

Class 6 LIMERICK Creative Techniques Six Entries

A manipulated or layered image that celebrates humor in nature. Entry must include a 4" x 6" print of the original image(s). Plant material not required.





2019 Annual Meeting Scarf

This beautiful scarf celebrates Zone I's New England maritime history, settlement and culture along with the GCA's purpose and goals through nautical symbols. Dominating the design of the 35" square silk scarf is the face of The GCA looking toward the horizon unwavering in its purpose. A 16-point compass rose encircles the face with a fleur-de-lis pointing north to one of the four principal winds. Surrounding the compass rose are 12 state flower flags, one from each of the 12 GCA Zones.

The GCA Demonstrates a Commitment to Education, News from Historian on October 02, 2018



In September 1925 the newly formed Committee of Special Publications began work on what would become the two-volume classic, Gardens of Colony and State. In addition to being the first book published by the GCA, the book was groundbreaking as it was comprehensive in scope, covering not just colonial garden heritage from the first 13 colonies on the East Coast, but historic gardens across the country -- Spanish mission gardens, Mississippi Valley French gardens and others. Widely considered the best reference on garden-making in the colonies and the Republic, the landmark publication traces the development of uniquely American garden design, exploring early garden

literature and its effect on colonial craftsmen, as well as pre-1800 account books of nurseries and seed houses. Fascinating stories of early horticulturists who inspired the establishment and patronage of botanical gardens for research, plant exploration, education, and public enjoyment are also included. The impressive collection of early prints and photographs of gates, statues, benches, pergolas, and landscape designs was commissioned at great expense, underwritten by the GCA and other generous benefactors. Gardens of Colony and State was reprinted in 2000 and is still sought after by collectors here and abroad.

Capital Hill Supports Monarch Butterflies, News from Conservation on October 05, 2018

Celebration was in order last week when Republicans and Democrats gathered to bring awareness to the Congressional Pollinator Protection Caucus. The event, led by Rep. Jeff Denham (R-Calif.) and Rep. Marcie Kaptur (D-Ohio), was designed to highlight the threats to Monarch Butterfly habitat and reached peak festivity when Representatives Denham and Kaptur released dozens of Monarch Butterflies, to underline the importance of their cause.
