

Policy and Planning Report, Shelley Rolfe 2019-20 Chair

SGC's Policy and Planning Committee compiles ideas from our committees, seeks out best practices, and recommends to the Board and to the Membership new by-laws and policies to streamline SGC's mission. Our efforts this past year were anchored by the leadership of our President, Diana Ackerley, and the collective knowledge of several past presidents, including Catherine Allan, Diana Neely, Jenny Wyatt, Suzette de Turenne, Laurie Riley, and Catherine Roach. Likewise, the expertise of Barbara Feasey, Caroline Goedhart, Sandy Hanower, Candy Lancaster, Betsy Pepper, Bev Martin, Lynn Mowe, and Charlee Reed advanced our insights and recommendations. We could not have accomplished our work without legal guidance from Karen Simmons plus the tireless work of Carlyn Steiner. Additionally, Kim Bishop helped me at every step along the way. Thank you all! Our incoming President-Elect, Barbara Feasey, has vast non-profit management experience and will artfully guide the committee in the coming year.

At its most recent meeting, the P&P Committee reported on various ways to temporarily install our 2020 -21 Board of Directors. Several options were reviewed for board approval. On May 7th, the board approved the following process:

Process for Alternate Induction of the Slate of Officers

On May 29, 2020, the remaining members of the Governing Board will meet on Zoom to fill the vacancies on the Board with the slate as presented by the Nominating Committee. Then, on June 5, 2020, the new Governing Board at full strength will "resolve" to delay the Membership's vote to approve the new board and budget until the first time it is possible for everyone to gather. Founders Fund Task Force Report


The Founders Fund Task Force has been busy, and has GOOD news to share! I am excited to inform Club members that our long-anticipated proposal is finally moving forward. Undaunted by the challenges of collaborating at a distance, the FFTF pulled together and on April 30th submitted to GCA our Letter of Intent to apply for the Founders Fund award this year. The full application is due at the end of September. There's work ahead but we've passed the first hurdle with flying colors.

The project site within the Arboretum has moved up stream from the Azalea Way pond and SGC Centennial Garden, but the scope is otherwise substantially the same. This shift was driven by the Arboretum's need to adjust their overall Rhododendron Glen project scope and defer pond restoration to the next phase. Shifting our focus to the stream course opens up wonderful new opportunities that actually strengthen our project. We believe SGC's proposal will be compelling to GCA reviewers on many levels. We are pleased to report that Tacoma Garden Club has already committed its support and written a wonderful seconding letter.










A very quiet day at the Arboretum. Everyone is doing their job at social distancing. By Suzy

VICTORY GARDENS: THEN AND NOW, Debbi Wilson

Victory Gardens, also called War Gardens, or Food Gardens for Defense, were planted with vegetables, fruits and herbs in public as well as private residences during World Wars I and II. Planting helped to supplement household rations, create self reliance and increase morale.

Home production helped to lower the price of vegetables needed by the War Department to feed the troops. Planted on rooftops, patios, garden beds and public places, the 14 million gardens at their peak, produced 40% of the nation's fresh vegetables! In 1943, Eleanor Roosevelt planted a Victory Garden on the White House lawn to demonstrate support for the effort. The last public examples from WWII, in existence today, are the Fenway Victory Garden in the Back Bay area in Boston, which is largely flowers, and the Dowling Garden in Minneapolis which remains planted with vegetables.

Today, Victory Gardens, or VG, can help boost the spirits during times of stress and uncertainty, build our food security and connect us with nature while we self-isolate at home. Working in a garden has a positive effect on mental health and well-being. It keeps us fit, enjoying nature, restores our senses and equanimity. The color green is known to be a restful, recharging color. Some researchers have coined the phrase, "nature deficit



disorder" to explain the lack of outdoor connection and its effect on our mental health. Whether growing food, flowers, shrubs, or trees, now is the perfect opportunity to garden-on your deck, stairs, indoor patio, containers or garden beds.
