The Zoom "meeting room" will open at 9:30AM if you'd like to join early for a virtual "coffee" and Shelley Rolfe will start the program at 10:00AM with announcements. The program will be on committee activities this fall that we can join. We'll hear updates from Auction Chairs, Sue Brickman and Cindy Bostwick, and then Sue Blethen, Barbara Feasey, Suzette de Turenne and Bev Martin will give short updates on the Fragrance Garden, Photography and GCA Scholarship Committees. To end the meeting, Zoom will place us in small group "chat rooms" for 10 minutes to discuss **Revolutionary Gardeners: The Gardening Wisdom of George Washington and Thomas Jefferson.** This is an exclusive GCA program that you'll be invited to view at home before the meeting.

Revolutionary Gardeners features Dean Norton (shown on the right), Director of Horticulture at Mount Vernon and Peter Hatch (shown on the left), former Director of Gardens and Grounds at Monticello. Dean Norton received the GCA Elizabeth Craig Weaver Proctor Medal for exemplary service to horticulture and historic preservation. Dedicating his life to managing Mt Vernon's historic gardens, Dean, along with a staff of 23 and a multitude of volunteers, combines 18th century gardening skills based on his research diaries, documents, and archeological findings with modernday soil and planting knowledge and techniques. Dean Norton, never reluctant to share his gardening expertise, has been called one of America's true horticultural heroes.





Peter Hatch received the GCA Historic Preservation medal in 2011 for his outstanding work in the field of preservation and restoration of historic gardens. Devoting over 30 years, Hatch uncovered and restored what Thomas Jefferson called his "Pioneering Garden." Combatting years of neglect in the Monticello grounds, Peter not only restored Jefferson's experimental gardening but also launched many educational programs. Honoring Jefferson's legacy, Peter founded one of the only scholarly horticultural centers in America, "The Thomas Jefferson Center for Historical Plants" and promoted Jefferson's "farm to table" philosophy.

The Conservation Committee is a very energetic and involved group of 30 women. If you are interested in being on this committee, please contact Suzy Titcomb. We have met twice this summer via Zoom phone calls. We were inspired to create an online resources for parents and possibly teachers to encourage curiosity and exploration of nature. We have collected a wide variety of outdoor activities from local and national organizations. Our committee is adding these resources to our SGC Conservation website. In the coming months we are going to decide:

- *Who is this program geared for (parents, teachers and age group)?
- *Is this program accessible to different socio- economic and ethnic groups?
- *What category does this fall under: which season, art, science, human skills or??
- *How do we market this information? Can we create an Instagram account to post these resources and then direct parents to an online site that we create?

Stay tuned to see what kind of an online program the Conservation Committee has created. You may want to use it with your grandchildren.

The Conservation Committee also encourages SGC members to learn more about the proposed methanol refinery near the Port of Kalama WA – along the Columbia River near I-5 between Tacoma and Portland. The Washington Environmental Council (WEC), Washington Physicians for Social Responsibility, Center for Biological Diversity, Sierra Club, and Columbia Riverkeeper are challenging the proposed refinery. The groups are represented by the nonprofit law firm Earthjustice.

Each year, SGC's Conservation Committee seeks advice from WEC about our region's top conservation priorities. In their challenge to the methanol refinery, Joan Crooks, CEO of Washington Environmental Council and Washington Conservation Voters says, "Our climate crisis demands the highest level of scrutiny, and we cannot allow massive new fracked gas projects to move forward based on outdated science and flawed evaluation."

What is new: The WA Department of Ecology on September 2, 2020 released a second Environmental review of the Kalama Methanol Refinery. Revising its prior findings, the report states the methanol refinery would use up to 320 million cubic feet of fracked gas per day, more than all of Washington's combined industrial use today.

Partners for Plants

Scholarship

Our Partners for Plants project, East Montlake Park is getting a facelift!

Little did most of you know that our park is home to Pump Station 13, which services storm water and sewage from Union Bay basin. Over the course of this Fall and next Spring, Seattle Public Utilities will be upgrading the pumping facility by improving the pumping capacity of Station 13 to lessen the likelihood of overflows into Union Bay. Part of the upgrade includes replacing the concrete walkway down to the Montlake Cut to meet ADA standards as well as improving landscaping and lighting near the pump station.

Last Fall, volunteers from SGC and Michelle K. McMorran of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers began the process of moving perennials such as our native Dicentra and western sword ferns to new locations to make way for the new walkway. There will now be a 'new look' with predominately native plants and some non-natives on both sides of the walkway, including the entranceway to the park. Some of the plants you'll see are: Oregon Oak, Arctic Fire Dogwood, Western Sword Fern, Spirea betulifolia, Epimedium 'Sulphureum' and Mahonia repens. The Seattle Parks Department has agreed to water during the first year and then let nature take over from there.

After the installation is completed, I hope everyone will be able to make her way over to the park for a viewing. As all wise gardeners know, the first year the East Montlake Park's plants will sleep, the second year they will creep and the third year they'll leap! In the meantime, I invite all SGC members to help keep the park looking it's best in the years to come.

Apple Spiced Pancakes

INGREDIENTS

1 1/3 c. all-purpose flour

1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, divided

1 tbsp. granulated sugar

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

4 tbsp. butter, divided, plus more for cooking

1 large egg, separated

1 tsp. pure vanilla extract

1 1/4 c. milk

4 large apples, peeled, cored, and finely chopped (about 5 to 6 cups)


1/2 c. brown sugar

DIRECTIONS

- Mix flour, baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, sugar, and salt in a medium bowl.
 Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter. In a large bowl, whisk to combine egg yolk, vanilla, milk, and melted butter. Gently fold dry ingredients into wet ingredients until just combined, then fold in 1½ cups of chopped apple.
- In another medium bowl, using a hand mixer, beat egg white until stiff peaks form.
 Fold egg white into batter gently with a rubber spatula until just combined.
- Make apple topping: in a small saucepan over medium heat, melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter. Add remaining apples, brown sugar, remaining 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, and a 1/4 cup water. Cook, stirring occasionally, until apples have softened and mixture is jammy, 10 to 15 minutes.
- In a large skillet over medium heat, melt 1 tablespoon butter. Pour about 1/4 cup
 pancake batter into pan. When little bubbles appear, about 1 to 2 minutes, flip and
 continue cooking until both sides are lightly golden. Repeat with remaining batter,
 adding more butter to pan as needed. Serve pancakes topped with apple mixture.
