
November General Meeting on November 19 – SGC Committee Showcase "Shorts" Part 2

Community Projects

Lynn Mowe, Chair of Community Projects, led two meetings of her committee in October where the members discussed ways SGC might help address the critical needs of our community brought on by the COVID pandemic. The committee will review proposals in the coming months and make recommendations to the board which, after review, will then be presented to the membership for approval.

Fragrance Garden

Public (Fragrance) Garden Fund is approximately \$7K shy of goal!

Our Public (Fragrance) Garden fund to support maintenance of the Fragrance Garden at CUH was established in 2019 with a \$5,000 grant from Community Projects approved by the membership. Generous contributions of almost \$8,000, along with a donation of \$30,000 from a member who wishes to remain anonymous, have brought the fund balance to slightly shy of \$43,000, leaving a little more than \$7,000 needed to reach the amount required to establish our fifth endowment with the Seattle Foundation. Annual distributions from this future endowment of \$50,000 or more will help cover increased costs for annual maintenance, along with occasional improvements and new plantings in the garden.



Roast The Pumpkin

Cut the pumpkin in half and remove the seeds, then cut the pumpkin in large pieces.

Separate the seeds and set them aside.

Drizzle the pumpkin pieces with 1 tablespoon olive oil and sprinkle with salt.

Roast in the oven at 450 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove from the oven and let cool.

Peel the skin off the pumpkin and puree the meat in a food processor, or chop the pumpkin and store in the refrigerator for another use.

Roasted Southwest Pumpkin Stew

Miz Helen's Kitchen

Ingredients

2 to 3 pound pumpkin, seeded and cut in large pieces

3 cups cooked chicken, chopped (for vegetarian leave out the chicken)

1 onion, chopped

3 cloves garlic, minced

2 cups roasted green chilies, chopped

2 cups hominy

1 teaspoon cumin

1/4 teaspoon chipotle chili powder

1 teaspoon cinnamon

4 cups pumpkin puree

4 cups chicken broth or (vegetable broth for vegetarian)

2 tablespoon Olive Oil

Sour Cream for garnish

Roast The Seeds

Season the seeds with:

1 teaspoon garlic salt

1/2 teaspoon chili powder

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon olive oil

Toss the seeds with the seasons. Pour the olive oil into a hot iron skillet and pour the seasoned seeds in the skillet. Heat on the burner for 10 minutes, then bake in the oven at 350 for 30 minutes until the pumpkin seeds are roasted. Remove from the oven and allow to cool in the skillet.

The Stew

In a hot heavy stew pot saute the onion and green chilies and garlic. When the onions are clear add the chicken and 1/2 cup of the broth. Add the cumin, chipotle chili powder, and cinnamon, mix well.

Add the hominy and pumpkin puree, mix well.

Begin to add the remaining broth 1 cup at a time stirring after each addition, until all the broth has been added. Cook the stew on low for 15 minutes and on simmer for 30 minutes.

Salt and Pepper to taste.

Garnish with sour cream and roasted pumpkin seeds.
