GCA RULES

- 1. Please carefully read and follow GCA flower show rules, general information and division guidelines. All rules as stated in *The Garden Club of America Flower Show and Judging Guide*, July 2020 Edition, shall apply.
- 2. All plant material must be correctly identified with the botanical and common names, if possible. Accepted references for nomenclature are:
 - a. AHS A-Z Encyclopedia of Garden Plants,
 - b. International Plant Names Index at www.ipni.org or <a href="https://ww
 - c. Plant Systematics at www.plantsystematics.org
 - d. missouribotanicalgarden.org/plantfinder
- 3. The Garden Club of America expects all exhibitors to be aware of the need to promote conservation of endangered and threatened plants. Plants collected in the wild and listed by the Washington Natural Heritage Program may not be exhibited in any flower show sponsored by a GCA club. Cultivated plant material listed by Washington Natural Heritage Program may be exhibited if accompanied by a typed card stating that it has not been collected from the wild or that it was collected out-of-state and giving information concerning its cultural requirements and methods of propagation. Natural Heritage Program lists of endangered plant material will be available before and during the show from the division chairmen and are available online at http://plants.usda.gov/threat.html
- 4. Plant material showing evidence of insects or disease must be removed immediately from the exhibition area. This rule will be enforced at any time during the show, whenever the problem is identified.
- 5. Fresh plant material must be in water or conditioned in such a way as to remain in pristine form while on exhibition. An entry not maintained in show condition may have its award removed.
- Locally invasive plants, diseased plant material, artificial plant material, live animals (including fish), taxidermy, natural birds' nests, feathers of any kind and protected sea life, including coral, are not permitted. http://plants.usda.gov/java/noxiousDriver

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. Entries are open to all Seattle Garden Club members, including provisional, and professionals in their disciplines.
- 2. Registration is required for all classes. Please see the different timetables for Classes 1-3 and Class 4, Par.
- 3. Entering in a show constitutes permission to use images of the submitted content in all GCA channels of communication.
- 4. While The Garden Club of America, The Seattle Garden Club and the home at 414 McGilvra Blvd East will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, responsibility for damage, loss or personal injury cannot be assumed.
- 5. The passing committee must pass each entry before an exhibitor may leave the show area. The passing committee reserves the right to refuse any entry that does not conform to the rules of the schedule. The exhibitor has the option of correcting the entry, if time permits. If not corrected, the entry cannot be judged, but may remain in place, marked "For Exhibit Only" with a brief, constructively worded statement explaining why it was not judged. The judges may not disqualify any entry passed by the passing committee, unless evidence of insect infestation or disease is identified.
- 6. Once an entry is passed, the exhibitor(s) must immediately leave the exhibition area. A passed entry may not be touched again by the exhibitor until after judging.
- 7. A novice is an individual exhibitor who has not won a first place ribbon or a GCA special Award in the division entered at a GCA Flower Show, GCA Major Flower Show or Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Show. Recipients of first place ribbons or awards in a club show are still novices in GCA, GCA Major Flower Shows, and Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Shows.
- 8. Please pick up your entry (or make arrangements for pick up) as scheduled between 2:30 pm 3:30pm on May 19, 2021

HORTICULTURE GUIDELINES

- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. Entries must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of two months unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
- 3. An exhibitor may submit one entry per class in Classes 1-3, unless an exception is made by the Show Co-Chairs to fill classes. An exhibitor may submit two entries in Class 4, Par, unless an exception is made by the Show Co-Chairs to fill the class.
- 4. The expectation is to allow an unlimited number of (registered) Class 4 Par entries, but COVID distancing protocols may restrict the show.
- 5. Containers are measured at the diameter or the diagonal of the widest point on the inside of the rim at the soil line.
- 6. An entry card made of card stock must accompany each entry. Entry cards can be downloaded from either the GCA or the SGC Website. You may type and print out your Entry card on card stock to use with your entry. Alternatively, you may bring a draft copy to the Show to copy onto an Entry card provided at the Show. Information required on the entry card must be completed in black waterproof ink.
- 7. A key card is required in Classes 1 and 3, to identify multiple species or cultivars being exhibited in the same container. A key card must be a 4 x 6 white, unlined card and typed or competed in black waterproof medium. The card should include either a diagram or photograph with identifying numbers for the plant list. For an entry which has been propagated by the exhibitor a propagation card is required.
- 8. Saucers, stakes and ties are allowed when appropriate and unobtrusive. Mats and stands are not allowed.
- 9. Containers should be clean, unobtrusive and compatible with the exhibit. Terra cotta clay pots are preferred, unless otherwise specified. Disguised double potting and top dressing are permitted. Top dressing must not float when watered.

- 10. All containers and accessories must be inconspicuously labeled with the exhibitor's name.
- 11. If desired for staging, the back of the container may be inconspicuously marked with a chalk mark.
- 12. Classes may be sub-divided and entries moved and/or reclassified at the discretion of the Show Co-Chairs and/or the judges.
- 13. Entries must be identified with correct botanical names. Example: *Aloe brevifolia* is underlined (unless it makes your card messy) or italicized. The genus is capitalized, the species not. If you know the cultivar, add this in a single parenthesis, not underlined or italicized. Sometimes, the species is omitted. Example: *Agave* 'Black Beauty'. When complete identification is unknown, follow the genus or species with sp.or cv.. Example: *Agave* sp.or *Aloe brevifolia* cv.
- 14. Entries will be judged according to the Scale of Points by which classes are to be judged, *Flower Show & Judging Guide, Pocket Guide 2020*

Par Scoring System

- 1. 90-100 = First blue ribbon
- 2. 85-89 = Second red ribbon
- 3. 80-84 = Third yellow ribbon

HORTICULTURAL CLASSES

Class 1 Hibernating Four Entries

A collection or three or more different, culturally compatible rooted plants, including one northwest native, displayed in a bread basket with liner of the exhibitor's choice. The basket pattern should be woven and sized to hold a large loaf of bread. Key Card Required.

Class 2 Emerging Together Four Entries

Two identical rooted plants in two identical pots with saucers. Pots not to exceed 8" in diameter/diagonal. Specimens will be judged for their matching characteristics as well as cultural perfection and presentation.

Class 3 Light of Day Four Entries

A collection of three or more different rooted succulents arranged in a hypertufa container. The container may be borrowed, purchased or made by the exhibitor. It should be light enough to be easily carried by the exhibitor. Key Card Required

Class Consultant: Catherine Allan

Class 4 Wide Awake Par

A single rooted plant of exceptional horticultural merit, which does not qualify for entry elsewhere in the Show. Cut specimens, orchids or hanging baskets are not permitted. Containers may not exceed 14" diameter/diagonal.

- A. Plants owned for six months to two years
- B. Plants owned for more than two years

CLUB FLOWER SHOW AWARDS

Best in Show, selected from among the first-place winners

Novice Award, selected among exhibitors who have not won a first place ribbon or a GCA special Award in Horticulture at a GCA Flower Show, a GCA Major Flower Show or Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Show.

Judges' Commendation(s) may be given to an entry, class, section, special exhibit or other aspect of the show that is of exceptional merit.
