Peter Seligmann is one of today's most dynamic leaders in the global conservation movement—bringing innovation and action to the forefront of biodiversity protection for more than 25 years. In 1987, he co-founded Conservation International (CI) and as Chairman and CEO, has positioned CI at the cutting edge of conservation, creating lasting solutions to biodiversity and sustainable development challenges—becoming a major international conservation leader with field offices in over 40 countries on four continents.

A strong advocate of building partnerships, Seligmann has forged groundbreaking projects between the environmental community and other sectors, including government and private industry. Under Seligmann's leadership, CI has pioneered conservation tools that are economically sound, scientifically based and culturally sensitive.

Seligmann holds a masters degree from Yale University's School of Forestry and Environmental Science. He holds honorary Doctorates in Science from Michigan State University and Rutgers University and in 2001, he was awarded the Order of the Golden Ark from the Netherlands. Seligmann serves on the board of the Wild

Salmon Center in Portland, Oregon and the Mayor's Environmental Council in Washington, D.C. He also serves on the advisory councils of the Jackson Hole Land Trust, Ecotrust and other not-for-profit organizations, including the Japanese Keidanren's Nature Conservation Fund. In 2000, President Clinton named him a member of the Enterprise for the Americas Board.
