Catherine Allan, Pam Green and Jenny Wyatt will present a video refresher with further insight into the mysterious world of Binomial Nomenclature aka the use of botanical Latin names. Learn about why and where to include this information when completing show entry cards as well as the correct use of Genus, species and the specific epithet. In doubt about when to capitalize? Join us to learn more.

Jenny Wyatt and Laurie Riley, co-chairs of the Hort Club Show May 18 will give us timely video tips about Par entries. They will cover everything from plant selection, container choice, potting medium and proper grooming techniques (is a blow dryer ever appropriate?) needed to complete the entry card.

GET READY FOR REAWAKENING! TUESDAY MAY 18 - WEDNESDAY MAY 19



Our Club Horticulture Show will take place on Tuesday May 18 and Wednesday May 19, outside at Pam Green's home.

The Show will be "live" for participants only, but it will be well documented. Everyone will be able to see a photographic recap of the event and the beautiful entries at SGC's June Annual Meeting.

Classes 1 (Hibernating), 2 (Emerging Together), and 3 (Light of Day) are full.

Everyone still has an opportunity to enter Class 4, Wide Awake. This is a Par class, described as "A single rooted plant of exceptional horticulture merit, which does not qualify for entry elsewhere in the Show. Cut specimens, orchids or hanging baskets are not permitted. Containers may not exceed 14" diameter/diagonal." Par consists of A. Plants owned for two months to two years; and B. Plants owned for more than two years. Please note the two-month ownership deadline.

Join the fun! Look around your garden and see what you might pot up to enter or already have in a pot. Registration deadline is Saturday May 15, although earlier would be appreciated! Simply email Jenny Wyatt, wyattjen@comcast.net, with your desire to enter, length of plant ownership, and whether you are a Novice. If you don't hear right back, give Jenny a call, 204-499-0543.

All members who have entered 'Reawakening" will receive a time slot for dropping off their plants on Tuesday May 18. The Show Schedule, entry cards, and a range of how-to resources are on the SGC Website. Please feel free to contact us with any questions you have.
