1. What is your committee and what you do?

Due to Covid, this past year saw a variety of outside photography field trips and almost monthly Zoom meetings and photo sharing through our SGC web site. Hopefully will see the same this year and eventually the addition of at least one in person Committee meeting with a potential speaker.

3. What is your favorite plant-based activity?

Finding opportunities to photograph in unique settings featuring a variety of plant material.

4. What are some of your favorite plants and why?

Roses: They are hard to kill and produce from spring to winter; I am also a member of the Seattle Rose Society and exhibit roses periodically.

Hostas: A huge variety of outstanding, interesting foliage – although many are a slug favorite.

Allium: My favorite bulb; there are many varieties in many sizes and they are very dramatic, even as they dry. A new great find is clump style Alliums, which bloom in later summer, after most are finished: *Allium* 'Millenium' and *Allium* 'Serendipity'.

Salvia: Love blue in the garden and the hummingbirds love them too.

Echinachea: So many varieties and sizes and the bees love it!

Heuchera: Very dependable and am particularly enamored with purple leafed varieties.

'Jack Frost' Brunnera: Very dependable with fabulous foliage that the slugs ignore.

Twice-Roasted Sweet Potatoes with Hot Honey



Ingredients

4 Servings

- 3 medium sweet potatoes or garnet yams, scrubbed (about 3 pounds)
- 1 Fresno or other red chiles, thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup honey
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter

 Kosher salt
- 2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar



Step 1

Preheat oven to 350°. Poke holes all over sweet potatoes and wrap each in foil. Place on a foil-lined rimmed baking sheet and roast until potatoes are tender, 60–70 minutes (if you have one, use a cake tester to poke right through foil). Unwrap and let sit until cool enough to handle. Increase oven temperature to 450°. Meanwhile, combine chile, honey, and butter in a small saucepan; season with salt. Bring to a simmer over low heat, stirring to combine. Remove from heat and stir in vinegar.

Step 2

Smash sweet potatoes with your palm, then tear into bite-sized pieces (including skin), the more irregular, the better. Place in a large bowl and add half of hot honey (do not include chile as it will burn); season with salt. Arrange pieces, skin side down, in a single layer on an unlined rimmed baking sheet and roast until browned and crisp around the edges, 20–25 minutes. Drizzle with remaining hot honey with chile.
