A Brief History of the Seattle Garden Club 1917–2020

The year 2017 marked the 100th anniversary of The Seattle Garden Club. In celebrating this milestone, we learned a great deal about the generations of remarkable women who have dedicated their time, energy and knowledge to the founding and ongoing success of our club. With each succeeding decade, they've enriched our community in incalculable ways through their shared passion for horticulture, design and the environment.

Year-long preparations for our Centennial began in 2016. Under the helm of Hope Stroble, a committee was convened to research our history and plan special events. A generous donation of \$100,000 was earmarked as an anniversary gift to the city. In an historic vote, the SGC membership elected to award those funds to the Washington Park Arboretum for the building of the new Azalea Way Centennial Garden in our honor.

The Seattle Garden Club has had a long and distinguished association with the Washington Park Arboretum and the University of Washington Botanic Gardens. It was our club which first envisioned an Arboretum for the University and then commissioned the Olmsted Brothers of Boston to design it in 1934. Over subsequent years, the SGC has maintained close and consistent support for UWBG, and today we maintain the SGC Fragrance Garden at its Center for Urban Horticulture. So, it is most fitting that our centennial gift to the Seattle

community established a beautiful new garden in the Arboretum. The garden was officially unveiled at our 2017 Fall Picnic with a parasol parade down Azalea Way and ribbon cutting ceremony.

The Seattle Garden Club was launched in 1917 by eight visionary women. Despite the tumult of a world at war, these founding members were determined to create an organization that would promote horticulture and preserve nature through education and community works. The first few years of the club were tenuous at best. But by 1923, the SGC had formalized its structure and affiliated itself with the Garden Club of America which had been established only ten years earlier. Although this affiliation obligated us to follow GCA rules, we have been more than compensated by the joys and advantages of associating with 200-plus garden clubs nationwide.

Regional and national meetings, visits from GCA officers, lectures by horticulture experts, and mutual projects with the Portland and Tacoma clubs have all led to a century of lifelong friendships and enriching experiences with like-minded women. We've had the honor of sponsoring two GCA Annual Meetings in 1930 and 1977, along with Zone XII meetings in 1968 and 1994. In 1991, we hosted the national Board of Associates, and in 2016, our club was selected to organize and host the prestigious Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference with renowned experts speaking to representatives from GCA clubs nationwide.

With each passing generation, the SGC has made significant contributions to the beautification of Seattle and its surrounding communities. The list of local landmarks credited to the Seattle Garden Club is impressive due to the dedicated efforts and foresight of its members. We have encouraged “pocket parks”, freeway plantings, wilderness preservation and bird sanctuaries. We have donated funds, not only to Lakewold, Island Wood and the Wetherill Preserve, but to the gardens such as the Lighthouse for the Blind, the Home of the Good Shepherd, the Burke Museum, and the Species Rhododendron Garden at Weyerhaeuser’s former headquarters in Federal Way. We have contributed to conservation education through teachers’ summer workshops, field trips and the Student Conservation program in our national parks. We have presented many horticulture experts and floral design speakers, sponsored classes and held competitive exhibits, not only for our own edification but for the public’s education as well. Here are just a few of the many notable and lasting contributions made by the SGC to our community at large:

- In 1921, the SGC planted 1,200 elms along Des Moines Way to memorialize soldiers lost in World War I.
- In 1925, we planted 100 pink dogwoods on the University of Washington campus.
- In 1930, the SGC planted trees along Aurora Avenue as it cuts through Woodland Park after we lost a valiant battle to keep the park from being cut at all.
- In 1932, we planted flowering crabapple

trees on the north shore of Green Lake to honor George Washington's Bicentennial.

- In 1934, we commissioned the Olmsted Brothers to design the Washington Park Arboretum. A year later, we funded the Samish Island Bird Sanctuary.

- The SGC worked to save the south shore of Shilshole Bay. In doing so, we helped create the present park and the linear Burke-Gilman Trail Park from an abandoned railroad right-of-way.

- In 1959, we initiated efforts to beautify the Lake Washington Ship Canal and maintain the Carl English gardens at the Ballard Locks.

- In 1992, the SGC collaborated with the Pacific Science Center to produce a special three-month Beatrix Potter exhibit from England which included a competitive flower show at its opening.

- In 2001, the SGC helped establish a community park at Planned Parenthood and funded the refurbishment of the Entry Shade Garden at CUH, the Healing Garden at Cancer Lifeline, and the rare plant collection at CUH.

- In 2002, we raised funds at our "Raising the Roof" flower show to help rebuild the Center for Urban Horticulture after eco-terrorists had destroyed it. A full 100% of SGC members donated to this urgent cause.

- Our annual Christmas Luncheon has become a popular holiday tradition with magnificent table decorations made by members and an extensive silent auction that funds our Community Projects each year.

- In 2005, two notable SGC families established gifts of \$30,000 each to the club via

separate accounts at the Seattle Foundation. The first gift endowed the Pamela Green Speaker Fund for nationally recognized horticulture speakers. It honors three generations of the Joshua Green family who have served as SGC Presidents. The second gift established the Iris Wagner Conservation Leadership Fund for nationally recognized speakers on important conservation issues.

- In 2006, we raised over \$27,000 at a special fundraiser in Diana Neely's lakeside gardens with magnificent art installations by the renowned glass artist Dale Chihuly. That same year, we pledged \$50,000 to the Seattle Art Museum for the Seattle Vivarium Nurse Log in the SAM Olympic Sculpture Park.

- In 2007, we refurbished the former Entry Garden at UWBG and renamed it the SGC Fragrance Garden. In gratitude, the University of Washington awarded The Seattle Garden Club with Benefactor Status to signify our generous lifetime contributions then totaling over \$100,000.

- In 2009, we hosted the very successful Fergus Garrett Lecture at the Asian Art Museum, followed months later by an Iris Wagner Conservation Symposium entitled "Toward a Healthy Puget Sound. The esteemed William Ruckelshaus served as the moderator for a panel discussion on this important topic.

- The SGC has a long distinguished history of support for the Montlake Cut Waterside Trail. In 1958, we proposed the original Lake Washington Ship Canal Project as a finalist for the GCA Founders Fund, and we've remained

involved ever since. The project was first designed by the US Army Corps of Engineers, landscape architects and the Seattle Garden Club. In 1970, we gave \$4,000 to establish the Montlake Cut portion as a National Recreation Trail. By 2008, the trail had suffered neglect and serious disrepair. Concerned members of the SGC met with the Seattle Parks and US Army Corps of Engineers at the site to initiate a restoration plan. The new East Montlake Park Restoration Project received \$2,500 from Partners for Plants (P4P), and restoration began with the support of SGC volunteers, Seattle Parks, the USACE and local Boy Scout Troop 15. Another \$2,500 in P4P monies was subsequently authorized by GCA for the propagation of native plants to replace invasive ones. The Montlake Cut Waterside Trail remains one of our most successful ongoing projects.

- In 2012, our preservation efforts at the Montlake Cut were recognized nationally with two prestigious accolades. President Barack Obama gave the SGC a Volunteer Service Award for our 254 hours of work at the East Montlake Park. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers awarded us a Certificate of Appreciation for our “outstanding volunteer service and performance at the Lake Washington Ship Canal.”

- In 2012, the Pamela Green Speaker presented best-selling English author Andrea Wulf who spoke about our founding fathers as gardeners, plantsmen and farmers. Four years later, this esteemed lecture series featured the acclaimed horticulturist, Allan Armitage, Ph.D.

- In 2013, an Iris Wagner Conservation Lecture was held at the Seattle Aquarium featuring Peter Seligman and Jean Enersen discussing how “We Are All Connected” in the goal of protecting nature globally. That same year, the SGC provided major funding for the Rainier Beach Urban Farm & Wetlands. We also participated in a nationwide tree project celebrating the GCA’s Centennial. We selected the *Thuja plicata* (Western Red Cedar) and *Amelanchier alnifolia* (Pacific Serviceberry) — both highly valued in Northwest Native American culture.

- In recent years, we have improved and expanded our SGC website and the electronic distribution of our monthly newsletter to facilitate better communication and involvement for our members. To preserve the legacy of older members, we also initiated a project to document many of their gardens. To date, four beautiful books have been published for purchase with photographs and biographies compiled by the SGC Garden History and Design Committee.

- In 2018 another Iris Wagner Conservation Lecture was held at the Seattle Aquarium with Kathleen Biggins of C-Change Conversations presenting an informative talk on the many aspects of climate change. To much acclaim the Seattle Garden Club was in charge of the Concierge Services for the April GCA Annual Meeting in San Francisco. At our own SGA Annual meeting we honored Dan Hinkley who has been made an honorary member of the Garden Club of America.

- During the 2018-2019 year, a new Rose Arbor was dedicated at the well-loved SGC Fragrance Garden at the UW Center for Urban Horticulture. The Arbor supports a repeat bloom climber, the fragrant *Rosa* ‘Colette.’

In December, our annual Holiday Luncheon and Auction eclipsed previous years’ attendance and revenue. A highlight of our year was the GCA Flower Show, “*Nature’s Poetry*” May 30-June 1. The event was a showcase of talent, beauty and creativity. The evening preview party and the amazing Flower Show were held at The Bellevue Botanical Garden.

- The 2019-2020 SGC year was extraordinary. In November, GCA leadership, including President Debbie Edwards, visited Seattle and asked members to support the Second Century Campaign. SGC leadership led the GCA visitors on tours of our Centennial Garden in the Arboretum and Seattle’s Chihuly Garden and Glass Museum, and hosted a luncheon and a cocktail party. March brought us the COVID-19 pandemic, which caused us to cancel all SGC in-person meetings, speakers, provisional talks, outings, Auction Events and the Annual Luncheon and Awards. Undaunted, our leadership team continued to work hard completing the year’s agenda by implementing new ways to share ideas and develop projects/proposals. One successful example was SGC’s virtual flower show: “2020 Vision amidst the Virus.” Nature and our gardens will sustain us during these highly unsettled times. We should follow the GCA recommendation going forward – “Keep Calm and Garden On!”

- Facing the Covid-19 pandemic, SGC pivoted to Zoom meetings during the 2020-2021 year. In June 2020 we held a virtual Photography Show of 300 entries which was shared throughout Zone XII. Thanks to the generosity of many members, in February 2021 a Community Garden Endowment (our fifth endowment) was created with the Seattle Foundation. Funds from the endowment will be used to support maintenance and improvements to the Fragrance Garden at CUH. On May 11, 2021, at the Garden Club of America Annual Meeting, Seattle Garden Club won the coveted GCA Founders Fund, with an award of \$30,000, for its “Rhododendron Glen: Healing a Historic Stream and Engaging All Ages in Urban Water Ecology” project at the Arboretum. The June 2021 Annual Meeting was held virtually and featured a slide show of recent virtual Hort and Photography Club Shows.

BYLAWS (Revised and Approved, 2020)

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**AMENDED BYLAWS
OF
THE SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB**

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of this corporation shall be THE SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB (referred to herein as “SGC”).

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS AND PURPOSES

The objects and purposes of the corporation shall be to stimulate the knowledge and the love of gardening, to aid in the protection of the quality of the environment, to encourage and assist in civic beautification, and to aid and carry on charitable, scientific and educational activities in all of the said fields.

The corporation may lease, purchase, receive by deed, devise or bequest, possess and dispose of all such real and personal property as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the objects and purposes of the corporation, and may borrow money for all lawful; corporate purposes, and execute and deliver notes, bonds or other evidences of indebtedness therefore, and may secure the repayment of any such loans, with interest, by a mortgage upon or pledge of all or any part of its real or personal property.

In the event of the dissolution of this corporation, all of its assets shall be donated to a non-profit corporation or corporations having objects and purposes similar to those of this corporation and no part of such assets may inure to the benefit of any Member or other individual.

**ARTICLE III.
MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1. Classes and Election. The Membership shall include the following classes of Members: Provisional, Ac-

tive, Sustaining and Non-resident. Members may include, at the discretion of the Governing Board, the following classes of Members: Honorary, Honorary Life, and Inactive. All Members shall be elected by the Governing Board, excluding Honorary Life.

Section 2. Provisional Members.

2.1 Qualifications. Nominations for Provisional Membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chair of the Membership Committee. Candidates shall have the following qualifications:

1. They shall demonstrate knowledge of and interest in horticulture, conservation, floral design photography, landscape design, or active participation in the work of a garden.
2. They shall be willing to share actively in the work and responsibilities of SGC and shall attend Horticulture classes and General Meetings on a regular basis for the first two (2) years.
3. Their principal residence shall be in Seattle or the surrounding environs.

2.2 Election. Candidates for Provisional Membership shall be reviewed by the Membership Committee. The recommendation of the Membership Committee shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Provisional Members shall be elected by the Governing Board at any Annual, Regular, or Special meeting of the Governing Board.

2.3 Term. Provisional Members are on a provisional basis for a minimum of two (2) consecutive years and no longer than three (3) years unless approved by the Governing Board.

2.4 Voting and Privileges. Provisional Members may vote on SGC matters, with the exception of changes to by-laws. However, they may neither hold office, nor be a Member of the Governing Board, nor propose or second a new Member, nor vote, nor participate in the privileges of Garden Club of America (hereinafter referred to as "GCA"). They may serve on any committee and may be chair of a special committee.

2.5 Dues and Fees. Provisional Members shall pay a one time initiation fee plus annual dues and other required fees.

2.6 Compliance. Failure to comply with requirements means forfeiture of Membership, including initiation fees and dues.

Section 3. Active Members.

3.1 Qualifications. Nominations for Active Membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chair of the Membership Committee from the Provisional Members having the following qualifications:

1. At least two (2) years of Provisional Membership, with regular attendance at Horticulture and General meetings and other SGC events.
2. Their principal residence shall be in Seattle or the surrounding environs.
3. Active participation in the work of a garden or demonstrated knowledge of and interest in horticulture, conservation, floral design, photography, or landscape design.
4. Demonstrated ability and willingness to cooperate in committee work and in the advancement of civic, cultural, horticultural, charitable, scientific and educational interests of the community.

3.2 Election. Nominated candidates for Active Membership shall be reviewed by the Membership Committee. The recommendation of the Membership Committee shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Active Members shall be elected by the Governing Board at any Annual, Regular or Special meeting of the Governing Board.

3.3 GCA Membership. Active Members shall also be Members of GCA.

3.4 Voting and Privileges. Active Members shall be qualified to hold office, to be a Member of the Governing Board, to vote on all SGC matters at meetings, to propose or second new Provisional Members, and to participate in matters pertaining to GCA.

3.5 Dues and Fees. Active Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.

Section 4. Sustaining Members.

4.1 Qualifications. Active Members who have completed ten years of satisfactory service as Members may, upon written request to the Membership Chair, be granted Sustaining Membership.

4.2 GCA Membership. Sustaining Members shall retain their Membership in GCA.

4.3 Voting and Privileges. Sustaining Members may vote on all SGC matters at meetings, may serve on committees and may exhibit at flower shows. They may not be an officer or serve on the Governing Board. They may propose or second candidates for Membership.

4.4 Dues and Fees. Sustaining Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.

Section 5. Non-resident Members.

5.1 Qualifications. Any Member in good standing whose principal residence is no longer Seattle and surrounding environs may become a non-resident Member.

5.2 GCA Membership. Non-resident Members shall retain their Membership in GCA.

5.3 Voting and Privileges. Non-resident Members may vote on all SGC matters at meetings, may serve on committees and may exhibit at flower shows. They may hold an office or serve on the Governing Board. They may propose or second candidates for Membership.

5.4. Dues and Fees. Non-resident Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.

5.5 Reinstatement. A Non-resident Member, upon returning to Seattle, may be reinstated to her previous classification, with the approval of the Governing Board and without payment of an acceptance fee.

Section 6. Honorary Members

6.1 Qualifications. Honorary Members may be chosen from within or without the Membership of SGC in recognition of outstanding service to SGC or the community.

6.2 Election. Honorary Members shall be nominated by the Membership Committee. The Chair of the Membership Committee shall present the nominations to the Governing Board for approval. Honorary Members shall be elected by the affirmative unanimous vote of the entire Governing Board at any Annual, Regular, or Special meeting of the Governing Board.

6.3 Dues and Fees. Honorary Members shall be exempt from dues and required fees and shall not have Active Membership responsibilities or status.

Section 7. Honorary Life Membership.

7.1 Qualifications. Honorary Life Members are those Active, Sustaining or Non-resident Members who have been dues paying Members of SGC for forty-five (45) years. Such Honorary Life Members shall retain the privileges of the class of Membership from which they were transferred.

7.2 Election. The Membership Chair shall notify the Governing Board of the transfer of those to Honorary Life status.

7.3 Dues and Fees. They shall be exempt from dues and required fees.

Section 8. Inactive Membership.

8.1 Qualifications. The Inactive Membership shall consist of any Member who has been in good standing but due to ill health or physical disability is unable to participate in SGC activities.

8.2 Election. To remain on the roster that person, or her representative, may request permission in writing to become an Inactive Member.

8.3 Dues and Fees. An Inactive Member shall pay no annual dues to either SGC or to GCA. If attending an SGC event, the SGC Inactive Member shall pay the required fee for the event.

Section 9. Resignation and Reinstatement.

9.1 Notice of Resignation. The resignation of any Member shall be made to the Membership Chair in writing and shall, at the discretion of the Governing Board, take effect only upon the discharge of all indebtedness to SGC by the resigning Member.

9.2 Reinstatement. Members who have resigned in good standing may be reinstated with an affirmative vote of ten (10) Members of the Governing Board. They shall resume their previous classification of Membership.

ARTICLE IV GOVERNING BOARD, OFFICERS, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. Governance. All affairs of SGC shall be managed by the Governing Board consisting of the Officers and the Chairs of the following Standing Committees:

- Club Communications
- Community Projects
- Conservation
- Finance
- Floral Design
- Horticulture
- Meeting Arrangements
- Membership
- Nominations
- Photography
- Policy and Planning
- Program
- Provisional
- Ways and Means

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of SGC shall consist of President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. No two offices may be held by the same person.

2.1 President. The President shall preside at all General, Governing Board, and Executive Committee Meetings. The President shall consult with the President-Elect on all appointments from the Active Membership, including but not limited to: (1) a Chair for each Special Committee; (2) as needed, ad hoc committee chair(s) and members; (3) delegates to GCA Annual and Zone Meetings; and (4) delegates to other garden-related meetings. The Governing Board shall approve all appointments.

2.2 President-Elect. The President-Elect shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. She shall preside at meetings in the absence of the President and shall assist as requested by the President. The President-Elect shall chair the Policy and Planning Committee.

2.3 Immediate Past President. The Immediate Past President shall assist as requested by the President.

2.4 Corresponding Secretary. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Club under the direction of the President and serve as the Yearbook Chair.

2.5 Recording Secretary. The Recording Secretary shall record minutes at all Board and Executive Meetings and shall send said minutes to Board Members and appropriate GCA and Zone Officers. She shall send to the Membership any information deemed necessary. She is responsible for maintaining the permanent records of SGC.

2.6 Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the Chair of the Finance Committee and shall have custody of all operating funds, properties and securities of SGC. She shall act as liaison to The Seattle Foundation who will manage the SGC Endowment Fund and any additional SGC Endowment Funds. The Treasurer's duties shall be subject to regulations as may be imposed by the Governing Board. Yearly budget requests shall be submitted by the Committee Chairs to the Treasurer who, with the Finance Committee, is responsible for preparing the budget and presenting it to the Board in the month prior to the Annual Meeting each year.

Section 3. Committees. The Governing Board may designate and appoint other committees of the board. Any such committee shall consist of two (2) or more Members of the Governing Board and shall have and exercise such authority of the Governing Board as may be specified in said resolution. However, no such committee shall have the authority of the Governing Board to amend, alter, or repeal the Bylaws; elect, appoint or remove any Member of any such committee or any Member of the Governing Board or officer of SGC; amend the Articles of Incorporation; adopt a plan of merger or adopt a plan of consolidation with another corporation; authorize the voluntary dissolution of SGC or revoke proceedings therefore; adopt a plan for the distribution of the assets of SGC not in the ordinary course of business; or amend, alter, or repeal any resolution of the Governing Board which by its terms provides that it shall not be amended, altered, or repealed by such committee. The designation and appointment of any such committee and the delegation of authority to it shall not operate to relieve the Governing Board or any individual Member of the Governing Board of any responsibility imposed on it or her by law.

3.1 Executive Committee. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of Officers of SGC. It shall have all the powers of the Governing Board between meetings. Any action taken by the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Governing Board at the next meeting.

3.2 Committee Chairs. Each Standing, Ad Hoc or Special Committee Chair shall report to the Governing Board at its monthly meetings or as the President may request.

3.3 Committee Membership.

1. **Membership Committee.** The Membership Committee consists of six Active Members serving staggered three-year terms and the Provisional Chair. In consultation with the President-Elect and the Membership Chair and with the approval of the Governing Board, the President shall appoint Active Members to serve on the Membership Committee to fill any vacancies.

2. **Nominating Committee.** The President shall invite the Immediate past President to chair the Nominating Committee. In the event of a vacancy, the President in consultation with the President-Elect shall select a member to chair the Nominating Committee. In consultation with the President-Elect and with the approval of the Governing Board, the President shall appoint four Active Members to serve on the Nominating Committee.
3. **Committee Membership.** Signup sheets will be provided to SGC Members to use to express their committee preferences for the forthcoming year. The Chairs of both Standing Committees and Special Committees may select their committee Members from among those indicating an interest in their committee on the signup sheets.

Section 4. Chairs of Standing Committees. The Chair of each Standing Committee shall hold a meeting as they deem necessary. Their responsibilities are to adhere to the committee guidelines as established by SGC.

ARTICLE V ELECTION OF THE OFFICERS AND THE GOVERNING BOARD

Section 1. Election of Officers and Chairs of Standing Committees.

1.1 Nominations. The Nominating Committee shall nominate from the Active Membership, the Officers and the Chairs of the Standing Committees. In addition, the Nominating Committee shall nominate the Treasurer-Elect to serve a one-year term concurrently with the 2nd year of the Treasurer's 2-year term; and further to provide that the Treasurer-Elect shall assume the position of SGC Treasurer for the two years following her one-year term as Treasurer-Elect. Members of the Nominating Committee are not barred from becoming nominees for office.

1.2 Governing Board Approval. The Nominating Committee shall make its recommendation for approval to the Governing Board. The Governing Board shall approve the slate of officers that shall be presented to the Members.

1.3 Notice to Members. A copy of the slate of officers, approved by the Governing Board, shall be provided to each Member of SGC at least two weeks prior to Annual Meeting.

1.4 Nomination by Members. Active Members may nominate additional candidates for the offices of President-Elect, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer-Elect, or any Standing Committee Chair, providing that in each case the nomination, endorsed by ten Active Members, has been presented in writing to the Recording Secretary not less than seven days before the Annual Meeting.

1.5 Election by Members. Members shall elect the Officers and the Chairs of the Standing Committees at the Annual Meeting. All elections shall be held at the Annual Meeting and shall be by 2/3 majority vote of the Members present.

Section 2. Term. The President will serve a one (1) year term and then automatically assume the office of Immediate Past President the following year for a one (1) year term. The President-Elect will serve a one (1) year term and then automatically assume the office of President the following year, for a one (1) year term. The Treasurer-Elect will serve a one (1) year term and then automatically assume the office of Treasurer the following year, for a two (2) year term. All other Members of the Governing Board shall serve for two (2) years unless special arrangements are agreed upon by the Nominating Committee.

Section 3. Removal. Removal of the President or any Member of the Governing Board may take place at any time by a 2/3 vote of the Members whenever it is in the best interest of SGC.

Section 4. Vacancies. Vacancies in offices or on the Governing Board shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the Governing Board.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 1. Annual Meeting. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Membership, on a date to be specified by the Governing Board. At such meeting, SGC Members shall vote for Officers and Chairs of Standing Committees; the election results shall be announced; awards shall be presented and the new Provisional Members shall be introduced to the Club.

Section 2. General Business Meeting. Annually, there shall be a Business Meeting of the Membership. The General Business Meeting shall be in lieu of the General Meeting in the month in which it is held.

Section 3. General Meetings. There shall be monthly General Meetings of the Membership unless otherwise directed by the President.

Section 4. Quorum. There shall be a Quorum at any meeting of the Membership in order for any vote(s) taken by the Membership to be valid. A quorum is one-fourth (1/4th) of the votes entitled to be cast at any meeting. The passage of any vote requires a two thirds (2/3rds) majority of those present.

Section 5. Robert's Rules of Order. All meetings of the Membership shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VII GOVERNING BOARD MEETINGS

Section 1. Annual Meeting of Governing Board. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governing Board, held in the Seattle region, within 45 days of the end of the SGC fiscal year.

Section 2. Quorum. A quorum consisting of nine (9) Members of the Governing Board is required for all transactions. All transactions shall be accepted by a 2/3 majority vote.

Section 3. General Meetings. There shall be monthly meetings of the Governing Board, unless otherwise directed by the President.

Section 4. Special Meetings. Special Meetings of the Governing Board may be held at any place and time whenever called by the President, or by any two (2) Members of the Governing Board.

Section 5. Notice of Meetings. No notice of the Governing Board's Annual Meeting shall be required. Notice of the time and place of any special meeting of the Governing Board shall be given by the Secretary, or by the person or persons calling the meeting, by regular or express mail, facsimile, electronic communication, telegram, or by personal communication over the telephone or otherwise, at least three (3) days prior to the date on which the meeting is to be held. Attendance at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where the director attends a meeting for the purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened. Neither the business to be transacted, nor the purpose of any meeting of the Governing Board needs to be specified in the notice or any waiver of notice of such meeting.

Section 6. Meetings Held by Telephone or Similar Communications Equipment. Members of the Governing Board or its committees may participate in a meeting of the Governing Board or such committees by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time and participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

Section 7. Proxies. Members of the Governing Board may not vote by proxy.

Section 8. Robert's Rules. All meetings of the Governing Board shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VIII

ACTIONS BY WRITTEN CONSENT

Actions by Written Consent. Any corporate action required or permitted by the Articles of Incorporation or Bylaws, or by the laws of the State of Washington, to be taken at a meeting of the Members or the Governing Board (or its committees) may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the Members or the Governing Board Members entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof. Such consent shall have the same force and effect as a unanimous vote, and may be described as such.

ARTICLE IX

FEES, DUES, FISCAL YEAR AND BUDGET

Section 1. Initiation Fees and Acceptance Fees. Initiation fees for Provisional members and Acceptance fees for Active members shall be determined by the Governing Board.

Section 2. Annual Dues. The amount of SGC annual dues shall be determined by the Governing Board and shall be payable on June 1st or in person at the Annual Meeting. Any Member who is delinquent in the payment of dues on July 1st shall be notified by the Treasurer. If such dues are not paid by August 1st, the Treasurer shall forward her name to the Chair of Membership for further consideration.

Section 3. Forfeiture. If the various assessments levied during a fiscal year are not paid by a member by the end of that fiscal year, membership shall be forfeited.

Section 4. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of SGC shall be June 1 through May 31.

Section 5. Budget. The budget shall be prepared by the Finance Committee, chaired by the Treasurer, and shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Necessary adjustment of, or additions to, the budget may be made by the Governing Board at any time thereafter.

Section 6. Loans Prohibited. The corporation shall make no loans to any Officer or to any member of the Governing Board.

ARTICLE X ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Section 1. There shall be a SGC Endowment Fund, which shall be separate from all SGC operating funds, and shall be placed, for investment purposes, with professional management outside SGC. The Governing Board must approve any new endowments and is responsible for placing them with professional management outside SGC for investment purposes.

ARTICLE XI DELEGATES

Section 1. Appointment. The President and a delegate appointed by the President in consultation with the President-Elect shall attend the Annual Board Meeting of GCA. The Governing Board shall approve the appointment. Should the President be unable to attend, an alternate Member shall be designated by the Governing Board.

Section 2. Reimbursement. The GCA Annual Meeting registration fees, travel expenses and room reservation of the President or her alternate and of one delegate shall be borne by SGC and limited by financial policy.

Section 3. Other Delegates. Delegates for all other purposes – Zone Meeting, Community Meetings, etc. – shall be appointed by the President, in consultation with the President-Elect and with the approval of the Governing Board.

ARTICLE XII AMENDMENTS

Section 1 Recommendations for changes may come from the Governing Board when approved by vote of ten (10) Members of the Governing Board or on the written proposal of not less than twenty-five (25) Active Members.

Section 2. These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or appealed at any meeting of the Membership of SGC by a majority vote (2/3rds) of the Active, Sustaining, and Non Resident Members present, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to each such Member two (2) weeks prior to the date of the meeting. These Bylaws will be updated annually and thoroughly reviewed every three (3) years.

OF
SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB**

REVISIONS

I. The Policy and Planning Committee shall review proposed revisions to an SGC policy. After completing its review, the Committee shall forward its recommendation to the Governing Board for its further consideration.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS

I. The Community Projects Committee solicits and reviews requests for funding of projects from the community or a committee of the SGC. All projects shall be consistent with the objects and purposes of SGC. (See Article 11, B-3)

II. Guidelines for Community Projects

1. Benefit to community
2. Stated financial need
3. Opportunity for membership participation, oversight and use of membership expertise
4. Appropriate to size and strength of membership
5. Source of pride and identity for SGC
6. Long term maintenance assured
7. Opportunity for collaboration with other community organizations
8. Educational value to the community
9. Timeline of the project

III. Deadline for the Committee to receive requests is November 1st. Any exceptions will be at the discretion of the Committee.

IV. All recommendations for funding made by the Community Projects Committee shall be approved by the

Governing Board. An individual project of \$2,500 and above shall be approved both by the Governing Board and by the membership. A project that would cause the fiscal total of all new projects in one year to exceed \$10,000 shall be approved both by the Governing Board and by the membership.

V. Funds from the Project and Charitable account shall be used to fund projects. The Finance Committee shall budget the amount of funds available to be awarded for Community Projects in the upcoming fiscal year and shall retain a budget cushion of at least \$50,000 in reserve.

FINANCIAL POLICIES

I. Accounts

1. The funds of SGC are accounted for in three categories.
 - a. Administrative Account Income to the Administrative Account comes from a portion of membership dues. Expenditures from the Administrative Account are expenses which support SGC operations.
 - b. Program Account Income to the Program Account comes from a portion of membership dues and from all fees. Expenditures from the Program Account enhance the programs for and education of SGC members and guests.
 - c. Project and Charitable Account Income to the Project and Charitable Account comes from fund raising, flower shows, special projects, endowment distributions and contributions. Expenditures shall be used to support the objects and purposes of SGC including community projects or contributions to other organizations, fund raising expenses, flower show expenses and special project expenses.
2. Endowment distribution (income) may be accumulated for a future project or remain in the Endowment Fund at the discretion of the Governing Board.
3. Excess funds, which accumulate in all SGC accounts, may be invested in a safe instrument upon the recommen-

dition of the Finance Committee and the approval of the Governing Board.

4. All donations, memorials and bequests received shall be credited to the Project and Charitable Account unless otherwise specified by the donor.

II. SGC Endowment Funds

1. SGC Endowment Fund

- a. Shall provide a permanent source of funding to support the objects and purposes of SGC. As an Endowment Fund, only the distribution can be used each year.
- b. SGC Endowment Fund shall be managed by The Seattle Foundation with the Treasurer as liaison to The Foundation.
- c. Gifts may be sent to SGC or directly to The Seattle Foundation-SGC Endowment Fund.
- d. Gifts may be made in the form of direct cash, contributions, or appreciated property. The President of SGC shall be responsible for appropriate acknowledgement of the gift.

III. SGC Speaker Endowment Funds

1. The Pamela Green Speaker Fund

- a. Shall provide speaker fee and expenses to be used for featuring well-known speakers to further promote Horticulture. SGC may use the speaker for GCA or SGC events and also as a tool for fundraising. It is permissible to draw down the fund below the growth needed to keep up with inflation with the understanding that over time the fund will be permitted to grow to the appropriate level.
- b. Shall be managed by the Seattle Foundation. Distributions from the Fund will be used for the expenses of the speaker events. The SGC Treasurer shall be the liaison to the Seattle Foundation.
- c. The SGC President and President-Elect will consult to appoint a Chair, who will, in turn, form a special

committee to include Horticulture Committee and Finance Committee representatives and others as needed for the specific event. As funds allow, the committee shall plan events and/or major speakers with the SGC Board's approval.

2. The Iris Wagner Conservation Lectureship Fund

- a. Shall fund lectures focusing on Conservation.
- b. Shall be managed by the Seattle Foundation. Distributions from the Fund will be used for the expenses of the speaker events. The SGC Treasurer shall be the liaison to the Seattle Foundation.
- c. The SGC President and President-Elect will consult to appoint a Chair, who will, in turn, form a special committee to include Conservation Committee and Finance Committee representatives and others as needed for the specific event. As funds allow, the committee shall plan events and/or major speakers with the SGC Board's approval.

IV. General

1. Reimbursements

- a. All reimbursement requests submitted to the Treasurer shall be accompanied by a receipt and a reimbursement form approved by the appropriate committee chair.
 - b. GCA Annual Meeting fees and expenses shall be reimbursed up to \$1000, per person for a maximum of two people.
 - c. The registration fee, and up to \$300 of expenses, for a maximum of two members to attend the Horticulture Workshop, the Zone XII Meeting, the National Affairs and Legislation Meeting and the Zone XII President's Meeting shall be paid by SGC.
2. Signature cards for all checking, savings, investment accounts and safe deposit box shall be updated each June.
3. All restricted gifts to SGC shall be reviewed by the Governing Board and accepted or rejected on a case-by-

case basis, based on the appropriateness to SGC objects and purposes as well as to possible tax consequences.

V. SGC Contributions to Other Organizations

- a. The Horticulture Chair and the Conservation Chair, after consultation with their respective committees, will combine their recommendations for contributions to organizations.
- b. Requests shall be submitted to the Treasurer to determine the amount available for distribution. If the amount available is less than the \$3,000 budgeted, the Treasurer will work with the Horticulture and Conservation Committee Chairs to prioritize the organizations and amounts for distribution.
- c. Combined requests shall not exceed \$3000; subject to yearly review.

VI. Dues and Acceptance Fees

1. Membership dues shall be \$230 for Provisional, Active and Sustaining Members, including transfers. Dues for Non-Resident Members shall be \$110 per year. Honorary Life Members and Inactive Members do not pay dues.

2. Meeting Arrangements fees shall be \$175 per year and are required from Active and Provisional Members. They are optional for Honorary Life, Sustaining and Non-Resident Members.

3. The initiation fee for Provisional Members shall be \$125.

4. Upon acceptance into Active Member status there shall be an additional acceptance fee of \$50.

5. The acceptance fee for members transferring into SGC shall be \$125.

6. SGC pays \$60 to GCA in annual dues for each member, excluding inactive members.

MEMBERSHIP POLICIES

I. The Membership Committee shall be selected by the President in consultation with the President-Elect and the Membership Chair. The Committee shall be composed of the Chair, the Provisional Chair, and six members, each member selected for a staggered three year term. For purposes of voting, a quorum [five members plus Chair] of the Membership Committee shall be present. Balloting shall take place at the last meeting prior to the presentation of the list of candidates to the Governing Board. A separate written ballot shall be cast for each candidate. Six affirmative votes shall be cast in person or by proxy for the vote to carry. The Chair does not vote.

II. Proposal for Provisional Membership

1. Candidates for Provisional membership shall be proposed and seconded by Active, Sustaining or Non-Resident Members, none of whom shall be members of the Membership Committee, relatives, or relatives by marriage.

2. Proposal for membership shall be made to the Membership Chair on forms furnished by the Chair. Forms must be postmarked no later than midnight December 15.

3. Candidates shall be personally known by at least one member of the Governing Board and/or Membership Committee and at least four Active and/or Sustaining Members of SGC.

4. *An Active, Sustaining or Non-Resident Member may propose one candidate and second another candidate each year.*

5. A Candidate who fails two times to pass the Membership Committee or the Governing Board may not be proposed again.

III. Election to Provisional Membership

1. The Membership Committee shall carefully consider each candidate proposed for Provisional membership.

2. At the March meeting of the Governing Board, the Membership Chair shall present for consideration the names

of those candidates recommended by the Membership Committee for Provisional membership.

3. Election to Provisional membership shall take place by written ballot at the April meeting of the Governing Board. Election shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes may be cast in person, or by a ballot mailed or sent by electronic means previous to the April meeting. There shall be no more than two negative votes.

4. Upon election of a candidate to Provisional membership, a formal invitation, including the amount of the initiation fee, shall be sent by the Membership Chair. A letter from the President and a letter from the Membership Chair shall immediately follow. Provisional membership shall become effective upon written acceptance of the invitation and upon payment of the initiation fee. Response and initiation fee shall be sent to the Membership Chair by a date decided by the Governing Board.

5. The Membership Chair shall notify the candidate's proposer and seconder of the decision of the Governing Board and remind them of their responsibilities for the new Provisional Member.

PROVISIONAL EXPECTATIONS

As Seattle Garden Club is a small organization run by volunteers, Provisional Members are expected to support and participate in all activities as best as possible:

- Attend Horticultural Meetings, monthly General Meetings and all Provisional Meetings.
- Participate in SGC workshops, community projects and field trips when offered.
- Participate in SGC events such as Holiday Luncheon, Public Speakers (Green and Wagner Lectures), Flower Shows, etc.
- Attend and create a table decoration for the Holiday Luncheon under the guidance of the Floral Design Committee.

- Make a presentation to the general membership on a horticultural topic provided by the Horticultural Committee.
- Serve on Committees which are of interest.
 - First year: Attend one meeting of four different “Standing Committees.”
 - Second year: Select two committees on which to serve.
- Pay annual membership dues and meeting arrangements fees.
- Upon acceptance into Active Membership pay an acceptance fee, currently \$50.

IV. Election to Active Membership

1. At the March meeting of the Governing Board, the Membership Chair shall present for consideration the names of those Provisional candidates recommended by the Membership Committee for Active membership.

2. Election to Active membership from Provisional status shall take place by written ballot at the April meeting of the Governing Board. Election shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes must be cast in person, or by a ballot mailed or sent by electronic means previous to the April meeting. There shall be no more than two negative votes. In the event that there is no meeting of the Governing Board, voting will be held by unanimous written consent of its members.

MEMBER TRANSFER POLICIES

I. Transfer from SGC

1. An Active or Sustaining Member who becomes non-resident may request the SGC President to send to the President in her new community a letter stating that she is an SGC Member in good standing.

II. Transfer into SGC

1. A GCA Member wishing to transfer into SGC shall reside in the Seattle area at least one year.

2. The President of the Transfer's former GCA Club shall write a letter to the Membership Chair stating that the candidate is a member in good standing.

3. The candidate shall be proposed by an Active or Sustaining Member of SGC who knows her.

4. The Transfer candidate shall have attended some meetings of SGC and shall understand its objects, purposes and operations.

5. The SGC Membership committee shall process the application of the transferring candidate who shall enter SGC as Active or Sustaining Member, whichever she chooses.

6. A Transfer has the option of joining the Provisional class for one year.

PROVISIONAL TRANSFER POLICIES

I. Transfer into SGC

1. A GCA Club Provisional wishing to transfer into SGC shall reside in the Seattle area for at least one year.

2. The President of the Provisional Transfer's former GCA Club shall write a letter to the Membership Chair stating that the candidate is a Provisional in good standing.

3. The candidate shall be proposed by an Active or Sustaining Member of SGC who knows her.

4. The Provisional Transfer candidate shall have attended some meetings of SGC and shall understand its objects, purposes and operations.

5. The SGC Membership committee shall process the application of the transferring candidate who shall enter SGC as a Provisional Member for two years.

MEMORIAL POLICY

The death of a member will be announced through email, in the Newsletter and at the Annual Meeting. It may also be announced at other SGC meetings.

The Corresponding Secretary will send a note to the family.

Individual members may make a contribution to the SGC Endowment Fund.

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

An Annual Business Meeting will be held at the time of the General Meeting in either January or February.

EVENTS POLICY

The Policy and Planning Committee shall maintain a three-to-five-year Events Calendar, subject to Board approval. The Calendar shall be posted on the SGC Website and in the Yearbook. SGC shall rotate key events on a yearly basis, including, but not limited to, The Pamela Green Speaker, The Iris Wagner Conservation Lecture and GCA Flower Shows. SGC shall endeavor to hold a GCA Flower Show to include the Floral Design, Horticulture, Photography and Conservation Divisions as frequently as every three years. Separate divisions are encouraged to hold judged Club Shows in non-GCA Flower Show years. A division may hold a Club Show separately or in concert with another division at monthly SGC meetings or luncheons. The SGC Judging Chair shall coordinate Club Shows with the Advisor of the respective division and shall send any request to calendar a Club Show to Policy and Planning for consideration.
