Gardener's Corner by Debbí Wilson

The Evolution of Philadelphia's Center City District: 1682

When William Penn arrived in New Wales, later to become Philadelphia in 1682, he wanted to establish a *"greene county Towne which will never be burnt and will always be wholesome."* Wanting to improve aspects of life in this newly formed Quaker colony and avoid disease and devastating fires that had plagued, London, his former city. With help of Thomas Holmes, they created a 10 -acre green at the center of the town, surrounded by four smaller ones, each dotted with trees. Franklin Square was used for grazing animals, military training and weapons storage. Logan Circle, was the site of public hangings. The two remaining squares were named Rittenhouse and Washington Square, sometimes used to bury the poor.

These green spaces, 350 years later, endure as a testament to the importance of parks in city life.
