

Conservation

The Conservation Committee is happy to report that we have arranged a boat tour of the Duwamish River for Thursday, April 27th starting at 10:00 a.m. until approximately 1:00 p.m. This tour is open to the whole club. The boat can hold up to 40 people. If we don't have enough sign-ups within the club, you will be welcome to bring a guest. We want to fill the boat! George Blomberg who is with the Port of Seattle will be leading the tour and has extensive knowledge of the Duwamish River clean-up efforts. In addition, we are hoping that Paulina Lopez, Executive Director of the Duwamish River Cleanup Coalition will join us on the tour. Paulina has worked extensively with DRCC as an advocate for South Park families adversely affected by the Duwamish River pollution. Please note that Beverly Martin had originally organized this tour when Covid hit and we are happy that we can re-schedule this important educational tour. Sign-ups will begin in January but please feel free to contact me any time with questions and/or to express your interest in attending.

Members of the conservation committee enjoyed a tour of Trees for Seattle in the Georgetown neighborhood. SGC funds are truly making a difference! Great job Community Projects and thank you Margi Allison for organizing such an informative tour.

The GCA has been focusing on the passage of RAWA or S.2372. Hopefully, by the time you read this newsletter the bill will have passed. This important legislation funds conservation and restoration of habitats, removal of species and diseases and reintroduces native species. Both Senator Cantwell and Murray are supporters of this bill.

The GCA has sent a letter to the EPA regarding Bristol Bay and the use of the Clean Water Act "to prohibit the development of the Pebble Mine in this pristine and critical ecosystem." To quote the GCA letter "...mining the Pebble Deposit without restriction on dredging, discharging, and filling wetlands of the area would irreparably harm the region's water resources, natural habitats, its population, economy and culture."

Please be sure to check the GCA website for updates on our legislative advocacy.

Special Members




This is a recent photo of our Honorary Life Member Mrs. Robert C. Lenfesty, Barbara, known to family and friends as Bobbie.
