Having a beautiful flower arrangement in the midst of a dreary winter always seems to brighten my spirits.

The Floral Design Committee is in charge of our February 6th Hort Meeting. We are thrilled to have Hannah Morgan of Fortunate Orchard as our speaker.

As Hannah describes on her website, "our designs are deeply rooted in the seasons of the Pacific Northwest and we source primarily from the West Coast - often from the Fortunate Orchard garden, steps away from our work table. Using blooms and branches

grown right here ensures that our designs are unique, of this place and a bit wild. Fortunate Orchard collaborates with clients who exalt in the natural world and who embrace unorthodox, unexpected beauty."

- * NEW we are asking members to bring a three-stem composition from their garden, no need for labeling the plants, below is an example from my garden. In the photos below, on the left are a series of containers and a frog, and on the right are examples of a composition with three stems. One in a slate container with a built-in frog (my favorite) and the second in a bowl with a frog. This exercise allows us to mix hort and floral design! All it takes is a container, frog and a walk in the garden. I have an arrangement year-round on my kitchen table!

Native Plants: Clarkia ameona

The common name of Clarkia is Farewell To Spring because this native wildflower starts blooming in late spring/summer and provides flowers until late summer. Little water is needed, but some extra plus deadheading extends its season. The flower is a prime source for all native bees and butterflies. It is an excellent cut flower that is long lasting. It fills in well in one's "holes" in a bed. Clarkia will reseed, especially in open, disturbed ground. It is a strong, upright plant and looks wonderful in meadow and sustainable gardens. The white variety is gorgeous, and Clarkia also comes in various lavenders, pink, magenta and peach.



Founder's Fund Site Visit & January General Meeting

Jacques White, the Director of Long Live the Kings and past Director of Marine Conservation at the Nature Conservancy of Washington, spoke to us at Graham Visitor Center in January. We learned a great deal about salmon stream restoration in the South Sound as well as current research and lobbying projects to enhance salmon returns in Puget Sound.



Following the January General Meeting, SGC members visited the nearly completed "Rhododendron Glen: Healing a Historic Stream and Engaging All Ages in Water Ecology" restoration project in the Arboretum. This is the site of our \$30,000 GCA

Community Projects

Through support from the Seattle Garden Club, the City of Seattle's Trees for Neighborhoods program and the UW Botanic Gardens, the Trees for Cool Neighborhoods program was launched in 2022. SGC funding provided an additional 100 trees and participant support. The program is exclusively available to residents in some of the focus communities identified by the City of Seattle's Urban Forest Management Plan and Equity & Environment Initiative. These

communities are prioritized because of their higher heat and low canopy. The SGC funding also allowed for the involvement of community partners, Dirt Corps and Duwamish Valley Youth Corps, along with guidance to participants in proper tree selection and siting for their residences. In addition, all program participants had their trees, mulch, and water bags delivered to

them.



The Trees for Cool Neighborhoods team has finished distributing all 100 trees and now program participants are busy with planting! They were excited to share photos of their newly planted trees.



This Incense Cedar, planted at a street end, will provide cooling effects to nearby houses and a shady spot for neighbors to rest and play.

The American Smoke Tree is able to withstand very sunny conditions, and will provide some much needed shade and traffic calming effects on this street. All program participants receive training on tree planting and care. This is an excellent example of proper mulching and staking techniques being put to use!


