The three Community Project grant recipients were presented and approved, and our Treasurer Sandy Hanower gave a concise and informative presentation on our upcoming budget as well as the state of our endowments. Each of these presentations, while taking 10 minutes, represent hours of work. Thank you to all who spent so much time helping our club to run smoothly!

We look forward to a presentation on the newest GCA flower show discipline, Botanical Arts, on March 16th at CUH. Sarah Boynton will be coming from Hingham, Massachusetts to speak to us and offer a workshop for anyone interested in furthering their skills in this area. Botanical Arts has been a part of many major GCA flower shows for years but not as a recognized discipline with its own judging program. That has now changed! Sarah has been winning Best in Show for Botanical arts for over 10 years and her talk promises to be inspiring. Please check with Caroline Goedhart, Floral Design chair for details on the workshop.

Looking forward to seeing you all at the March 6th Hort meeting, also at CUH. Regardless of the outside temperature, there will be Springtime inspiration for us all!

Policy and Planning - Annual Business Meeting Wrap Up




Thank you to all who participated in our brainstorming session at our annual Business Meeting on Thursday, February 16th. I enjoyed watching the engagement and lively conversation throughout the physical meeting at CUH, and there was a lot of participation from the remote participants as well. I have summarized both so everyone can see what was discussed (for those of you interested, photos of each of the posters where everyone voted are on the SGC website, along with some photos of the morning). Our work was facilitated by Cassa Hanon*



By the end of the hour several themes emerged - we want the SGC to be involved with planting trees, providing gardening space and education in underserved areas and to help children learn about gardening.

Some of the comments about what we want the future to look like:



- * Teaching both children and adults about the benefits, basics, and joy of growing their own food, with a focus on community gardens in underserved areas.
- * SGC partners with community colleges, universities, other garden clubs (throughout the state) with a focus on urban gardens for food production and collaborating on open spaces in the region.
- * Trees! Supporting canopies in underserved areas, including schools.
- * Clean waterways, to support wildlife, clean water. Support the continued clean-up of the Duwamish, which in some ways is the soul of the city.
- * Supporting floating gardens on Lake Washington
- * Creating an elevated garden downtown







The next step in this process is to figure out how we want to address these ideas through the work of the SGC.

Sarah Boynton is a passionate flower show competitor, specializing in Botanical Arts and traditional flower designs. She has earned top honors in Flower Shows in Boston, Newport and Philadelphia along with numerous Artisan and Best in Show awards. She won second place at the 2011 WAFA World Flower Show in Boston first place and Best Craft Exhibit at the 2014 WAFA World Flower Show in Dublin, Ireland and third place at the 2017 WAFA World Flower Show in Barbados.





Boynton finds her raw material "just about everywhere she goes. "I'm gathering materials all the time," the Massachusetts resident said. "Hiking with my dog. I might see a cool mushroom and gather it. You start looking at things, at the details — the dogwood flowers, for instance, that have a tiny piece of something I could use for jewelry or pokeweed for spacers. It's an ongoing project." 

Next Hort Meeting Monday, March 6th.



Although there were days of doubt, spring is truly coming to the Northwest!. Jonquils are yellowing yards. Poppies, pansies, and even peonies are readying to pop open. And no one is better at exemplifying spring than Cindy Funes, our speaker for the March 6th Horticulture Program. She is sunshine herself with her warm personality, passion for plants and people, as well as her devotion to color. Her



endeavor in her container gardening business is to match plants with the personality of the person. She's eager to empower others to express themselves in their gardening pursuits rather than the accepted norm. With skills refined through her involvement with the horticultural program at Lake Washington Institute of Technology, Cindy has become masterful at teaching others much of what she has learned in her 14 years as a plant container specialist. Her talk will focus on tools to use in the maintenance and care of container gardening. It's going to be a great show! Bring a friend!

Native Plants: Linnaea borealis ssp. longiflora

Linnaea borealis is a creeping evergreen herb with trailing and flowering stems in open forests, forest edges and peat lands. It grows in forested and mountainous areas on both sides of the Cascade crest in Washington.

This plants grows up to 4 inches with pinkish-white nodding, trumpet-like, fragrant on thin Y-shaped stalks. The leaves are elliptic with a few shallow teeth and are smooth and dark green. Dry nutlets with sticky hairs are produced. The Carrier, Tanana and Snohomish tribes haves used the plant for food. A poultice of the whole plant has been applied to the head to treat headaches






