Lysichitum americanum/ Skunk Cabbage or Swamp Lantern

It is a mystery why this unique plant was given the unfortunate name of "Skunk Cabbage" as it neither smells like the black and white mammal nor is closely related to the cole slaw vegetable. Instead



this buttery yellow plant will brighten boggy areas of Pacific Northwest gardens that are often difficult places to improve. The "flower" of this plant is most unusual. There's a brilliant yellow wrapper that protects male and female flowerlets. Blooming comes as a surprise in March and April and can last into the autumn when magnificent green leaves thrive. In recent years this Northwest native has been renamed "Swamp Lantern" in hopes of improving its popularity.

Joint Meeting- Luncheon in Tacoma

n April 19th the Tacoma Garden Club welcomed Seattle Garden Club members to the Joint Luncheon and meeting on Wednesday, April 19th at the Tacoma Country and Golf Club. Our speaker was be Guido Rahr, President and C.E.O. of the Wild Salmon Center. He will present, "Preserving Wild Salmon Around the Pacific Rim." The Wild Salmon Center was founded in 1992. Six years later Mr. Rahr joined the organization and introduced the idea of an archipelago

stronghold, a Pacific rim network of protected salmon rivers. This became the first international effort to protect the habitat of Pacific salmon. Under his leadership the Wild Salmon Center has developed scientific research,

habitat protection and fisheries improvement projects in dozens of rivers in Japan, the Russian Far East, Alaska, British Columbia and the Pacific Northwest, raising over \$100 million in grants, establishing eight new conservation organizations, and protecting three million acres of habitat including public lands management designations and eight new large scale
