

Common Ground

SGC Common Ground Special Committee approved by Board

The ad-hoc Committee on Building Diversity was formed in 2021, mirroring GCA's newly established committee with a similar name. Last year the GCA Board created a new standing committee with the name "Common Ground" to build on the work begun with the ad-hoc committee. SGC Immediate Past President Barbara Feasey was appointed to the GCA Common Ground Committee in June 2022 for a two-year term as a club representative.

With the move by GCA to further integrate this important effort into their structure, the SGC adhoc committee thought it would be advantageous to do the same for our club. We requested, and received, board approval to become a special committee called Common Ground. Look for more information on this committee in the coming year, and please contact any of the current committee co-chairs (listed in Yearbook on page 41) with questions or suggestions.

Bylaw Changes

Please review these important Changes to our Bylaws to be approved by the membership at our June meeting. The role of President elect has changed, see pages B-12 &13 in Yearbook.

Proposed Bylaws Changes May 2023

Section 5.3.1 President.

(Replaces section 5.3.1, page B-12)

- a) remains the same (see page B-12)
- b) During the year when a President-elect is a member of the board, the President shall consult with the President-elect on all appointments including, but not limited to: (1) a chair for each Special Committee; (2) a chair and members for each Ad Hoc committee; (3) delegates to GCA Annual and Zone Meetings; and (4) delegates to other SGC related meetings.
- c) The Governing Board shall approve all appointments (see B-13)

Section 5.3.2 President-elect.

(Replaces section 5.3.2, page B-13)

The President-elect shall serve on the Board of Directors, assist the president, serve as the presiding officer in the absence of the president, and become the president after completing a one-year term as President-elect. She may vote at board meetings. She shall administer a member survey each year, in consultation with the president.

Reimbursement Policy Changes

FINANCIAL POLICIES Page p-6

IV. General

- 1. Reimbursements
 - a. (remains the same)
 - b. SGC members attending either the GCA Annual Meeting or the National Affairs and Legislation Meeting (NAL) shall each be reimbursed for registration fees, airfare (not to exceed \$1,000), and other trip expenses (not to exceed \$1,000). Reimbursement shall be limited to two SGC members for each of the two meetings.
 - c. SGC members attending the GCA Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference, Zone XII Meeting or Zone XII Presidents' Meeting shall each be reimbursed for the registration fee and a maximum of \$700 of expenses. Reimbursement shall be limited to two SGC members for each of the three meetings.

Native Plants

Camas (Camassia quamash)

Now is a great time to find an excuse to drive south to Portland or beyond as the roadsides are abloom with the beautiful blues of the camas flower. This bulb, also known as the "Indian Hyacinth "played an important part in the diet of native

peoples, and is still eaten today. It makes for a lovely and easy to grow garden plant here in the Pacific Northwest because it does best in dappled shade, and moist fairly heavy soil.

Originally, it was thought to be of the lily family, but it actually is more closely related to asparagus. Like the vegetable, the star- shaped blue flowers of the camas climb up the cladoles or leaves of the stem. Their yellowish stamens twitch about not unlike a cat's whiskers. There are also several other varieties that bear pale blue, violet and even white blossoms . Enjoy! Carey Davis


