# WESTERN FISHERIES RESEARCH CENTER OFFERS INSIGHT INTO HEALTH AND PRESERVATION OF OUR LOCAL SALMON RESOURCES

I hope you all had a wonderful summer! The conservation committee is fortunate to have members with vast knowledge of environmental issues and initiatives. Our newsletter column will feature articles by a committee member highlighting an area of conservation important to them. This month we are fortunate to have Suzette de Turenne share her visit to the Western Fisheries Research Center. Thank you Suzette!

Cindy Bostwick - Conservation Chair

In early July my daughter invited me to join her at an Urban Artworks community project at Magnuson Park. USGS (U.S.



Geology Survey) Western Fisheries Research Center (WFRC) had contracted with Urban Artworks to organize the design and completion of a mural covering a small building on their research center property for their "Save Our Salmon" program.



Open to all ages and abilities, the community was invited to sign up for stints helping complete the paint-by-number mural that had been created and sketched onto the building by young artist, Austin Picinich. This was well organized and lots of fun, as well as very rewarding. In one day, the building, at first closely resembling a cardboard box with a roof and doors, was transformed into a fun, colorful piece of art representing the amazing work going on behind closed doors.

What does this have to do with Conservation, you might ask? Well, part of the experience included a tour of the much larger research facilities located directly across the parking lot of the small office building. The tour organizers were thrilled that so many volunteers were interested in



the tour, which had been pulled together by a handful of the on-site scientists. The reality was that hardly anyone involved with the volunteer painting even knew that this facility existed and definitely were unaware of what they do there. Research at the WFRC "focuses on the environmental factors responsible for the creation, maintenance, and regulation of fish populations including their interactions in aquatic communities and ecosystems." This particular research center focuses on salmon, their physical and habitat health. The Fish Health Program (FHP) "conducts science focused on understanding the control, distribution and severity of infectious diseases affecting hatchery and wild fish"...and "...focus on fish health issues in the western landscapes of the Columbia River, Puget Sound and Klamath Basin". Our tour was an anomaly, as the government facility is typically only available to employees, scientists and research professionals. Yet, there

is hope that the success of this tour and the obvious interest shown by the public, will inspire them to consider periodic organized access. 

### The Reed Garden - Shinka Suru

On June 2, 2023 the Smithsonian Archive of American Gardens accepted Seattle Garden Club member Vicki Reed's garden - Shinka Suru. WA065 is the catalogue number and the pictures are stunning.

Set on Lake Washington, the Reed Garden - Shinka Suru is a suburban garden designed in what the owners and Landscape Architect Terry Welch refer to as "Japanese Fusion," a fusion of Japanese landscape design principles, within the Northwest landscape.

The Japanese term "Shinka Suru" means "unfolding" in English. The entire garden sits on just over an acre and is shaped roughly as a rectangle with a handle. Japanese gardens develop their structure from an empathic response to nature, mountains and water. In the Reed Garden-Shinka Suru one doesn't feel the property as lines, but as curves which lead and unfold different viewpoints and vistas with color, texture and layers of levels.

Typical Japanese design elements usually include water and mountains which match well with the lot placed by the existing lake and its views of Mount Rainier. In addition, an asymmetrical bridge over two ponds was created to reach the entrance of the house where the sound of water greets you from a hidden fountain.

SGC volunteers Anne Dor, Debby Smith, Mary Turner, and Jo Anne Rosen all collaborated with Vicki Reed to create a submission that was accepted by the Smithsonian in a record 3 days on June 2, 2023
