Native Plants: Tellima grandiflora

Three plants came to mind when I was about to write this article – *Tellima grandiflora*, *Tiarella trifoliata* and *Vancouveria hexandra*. After perusing all of my books at home on these three, I settled on *Tellima grandiflora*, since there is only one species of this plant, making my job easier(!), and I have some in my yard!



In this very cold rainy winter we are having, the dry days of summer are hard to imagine, but we will be there again, before we know it, wondering if our plants are getting enough moisture. *Tellima grandiflora* is one of those Northwest Natives that can survive in a broad range of conditions, from full sun to shade and even is categorized as being appropriate for the dreaded category of dry shade by several garden experts. Of course its favorite spot would be in moist soil with partial shade. This plant is considered to be a hardy evergreen perennial but that all depends on what kind of winters we have – so, perennial definitely, evergreen maybe.

Tellima grandiflora is a member of the Saxifrage family. It has the benefit of serving as a good groundcover with its basal growth of soft green rounded to scalloped hairy leaves almost like a maple leaf. Thin hairy stalks shoot up to 2 feet in the

spring bearing clusters of fragrant, dainty little fringe-edged flowers of light green, white and cream, which then age to a dark red. Common names for this plant are Fringe Cups, Alaskan Fringe Cup, False Alum Root, Bigflower Tellima and Fragrant Fringecup.

I have always thought of this plant as a great mainstay for an inviting shady place, and it has the added benefits of being a groundcover with pretty good drought tolerance. The Skagit nation used this plant to make a tea to help with loss of appetite. The plant has been found to have some antiviral qualities as well. *Tellima grandiflora* deserves a spot in your shady happy place.

Awards



The SGC Awards Committee wishes to inform you that on January 8, 2024 the Garden Club of America released the names of the 2024 National Medalists. Each year, the Garden Club of America honors up to 10 amazing individuals or organizations for distinguished achievements in areas that align with the purpose of the GCA. This is the Garden Club of America's highest honor.

This year Tom Campion, Seattle, Washington has been awarded the Frances K. Hutchinson Medal for distinguished service to conservation, environmental activism, and internationally lauded work to protect irreplaceable wilderness areas.

In mid 2022, The Seattle Garden Club Awards Committee began the proposal for Tom Campion. An "Intent to Propose" a National Medalist was accepted by The Garden Club of America Awards Committee, in October 2022. The proposal required securing a seconder for the recipient and 6 supporting letters, plus a great deal of additional material related to Tom's dedication to conservation and the environment. The proposal was submitted to The Garden Club of America Awards Committee, in January 2023. The Garden Club of America will present the medal to Tom at its 111th Annual Meeting in April, 2024 in Hartford, CT.

Tom Campion is more than deserving of this Conservation medal. He has been recognized for his conservation and environmental efforts, including receiving the 2016 Environmental Leadership Award from the League of Conservation Voters. He is a founding board member of Conservation Northwest, is chairman emeritus of the Alaska Wilderness League, and is active in The Wilderness Society. Tom is a true environmental champion, who according to Governor Jay Inslee in his seconding letter, stated "Tom has done more than anyone on the globe to save the Arctic."

Past recipients of this conservation medal include Rachel Carson, Douglas Brinkley, The Honorable Stewart L. Udall, Roger Tory Peterson and Edward O. Wilson.

The Photography Committee welcomes <u>Robin Layton, Photographer</u> as our February 15th General Meeting Speaker.

During her 25 years as a photojournalist, renowned photographer Robin Layton has produced countless notable photographs and earned a place among the world's top photographers. By age 24, she was honored by LIFE magazine as one of the eight most talented photographers in America. In 1991, her image of a young departing soldier, embracing his daughter on the USS John F. Kennedy, was used globally for ads including AT&T and the USO and was on the cover of LIFE Magazine's The Year in Pictures issue. Her photo story on runaway teens in downtown Seattle was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize. Sports enthusiasts will remember her iconic photograph of Ken Griffey Jr. from the 1995 American League playoffs ("The Smile at the Bottom of the Pile"). She has been a Nikon Ambassador since 2013.

Seattle Magazine voted her one of the most influential people of 2020.

After an award-winning career at five newspapers, including staff positions with the Virginian-Pilot and the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, Robin embarked on a freelance career that has taken her on assignments around the world. Along the way, she has photographed everyone from prom queens to actual kings, street people to presidents; personalities from Jennifer Aniston to Oprah Winfrey.

Since 2007, she has been commissioned to create artwork for commercial buildings and private residences including multi media such as: video art,

wallpaper/wall coverings and even high quality hand woven rugs that are made in Nepal, created from her images. She has also expanded the boundaries of traditional photography, combining her images and video with vintage found objects to create critically acclaimed and highly sought art pieces.

What pictures do best is capture a moment in time. Robin's work illuminates the life within that moment. She compels you to take a second look, a new view of the world around us.

Robin will have her "Rain" and "The Lake" books available at the meeting.
