


I was looking through a copy of "Country Life" (A weekly

Using the term 'pest' versus 'beneficial insect'. That perhaps we rethink lawns that require herbicides, insecticides, synthetic fertilizers as contaminated areas, rather than pristine and tidy. Interesting how our choice of words conjures up entirely different ways of looking at the world and our environment.

Bylaw Change proposal for vote at March Business Meeting

It has been a busy and exciting year in the Membership Committee. Our committee has evaluated the various aspects of joining and immersing oneself in our garden club. We have made our application process more accessible by reducing the references from four to two, reduced the tenure of Provisionals to one year, and replaced the Provisional talk with a Horticulture Meeting produced by the Provisional team.

We have one more item we would like to propose to our SGC Membership. I presented this to the Board at the February board meeting, and it was unanimously approved. Our bylaws require a vote by our members as well, which will occur at our March 21st Business Meeting. The information presented serves as notice to our members. Section 3.3 Notice requires members are informed of any bylaw change at least two weeks prior to the vote.

RECOMMENDED CHANGE:


d) May propose or second a candidate for membership *after completing 2 years* of *Active membership.*

Summary of Founders Fund projects for 2024

Below is a brief summary of the three finalists for the GCA Founders fund award for 2024. Please use the link below for more detailed information on each of the projects. (As a point of reference, the SGC was awarded a Founders Fund in 2021to restore the Rhododendron Glen at the UW Arboretum.)

Each club is allowed one vote and the SGC's vote will take place at our business meeting on March 21st.

- 1. **Replanting Indigenous and Historic Northeastern Species** to create an edible plant learning center at the Jay Estate located in Rye, NY.
- -Proposed by The Little Garden Club of Rye, Zone III

This project will implement a custom design by GCA honorary member Larry Weaner for planting of a 2.7-acre area that will restore edible indigenous and historic northeastern plant species to create an Edible Plant Learning Center.

Since 1992, working with other nonprofits like Mount Vernon Youth Bureau, African American Men of Westchester, American Women of African Heritage, and the Community Resource Center (formerly Hispanic Resource Center) of Mamaroneck, JHC has already brought thousands of fourth through ninth grade students, primarily from Title I schools, for free, interactive tours that interpret powerful narratives of American history and changing land usage as they are still visibly imprinted in the landscape. These students and their families will be among those to benefit from this new native classroom.

The plantings will include native vegetation with high wildlife value, enhance wildlife forage diversity, interface with nearby areas to increase habitat value and species for foraging

2. **Conserving Natives!** The Restoration of an Orchid Learning Center

-Proposed by the Garden Club of Palm Beach, Zone VIII

Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden reports that more than a century ago, "millions of orchids were ripped from South Florida trees and packed into railroad cars destined to be sold as disposable potted plants in northern states. Orchid populations dwindled to catastrophically low levels." The objective of the project is to create the Pine Jog Orchid Learning Center, the hub of which will be a re-creation of Elizabeth's original slat house that once stood on the property and housed hundreds of native orchids and plants.

The Orchid Learning Center will provide volunteer opportunities, a space to reinforce the importance of native plants through educational signage, and offer learning activities such as lectures, public tours, and student field trips.

In addition to the 1,000 diverse students attending the Title I elementary school located on the Pine Jog campus, the Orchid Learning Center will be visited by thousands of additional students, parents, and public visitors each year. Link for more here https://pinejog.fau.edu/

3. Green Space Becomes Caring Space: Church Health Community Garden


Proposed by the Memphis Garden Club Zone IX

The Memphis Garden Club project is designed to enrich the existing Church Health Community Garden (CHCG) by constructing a multipurpose pavilion. The heart of the proposed project, the pavilion, will offer a versatile space for hosting workshops, lectures, group activities, and communal gatherings throughout the year. Our partnership with Church Health will provide integrated health care to include wellness programs such as yoga, physical therapy, and occupational therapy. The pavilion will serve as a focal point for communal gardening, produce sharing, and social events. As a faith-based, not-for-profit health care institution, Church Health

believes in caring for one another as each of us would like to be cared for.

The club's ongoing support includes funding as well as the commitment of Memphis GC Garden Diggers to the garden's overall health through weeding, pruning, maintaining soil health, installations, irrigation oversight, harvesting, education, workshops, class instruction, and more. link here

Native Plants

My Love Affair with Erigeron glaucus 'Bountiful' by Megan Smith

My mission was clear. I needed a plant that checked all the boxes. Full sun... check; drought tolerant... check; west coast native... check; pollinator plant... check; and lastly, able to deal with sandy dry soil... check.



Introducing Erigeron glauca 'Bountiful' – one of my new favorite perennials! This lovely semi evergreen perennial never ceases to amaze me with her cheery presence. Lavender rays encircle a large yellow floret disc that entertains our pollinators (and me!) from April through mid-November. Yes, you heard it right, eight months of visual joy. To ensure success, I waited until October to plant this beauty promising myself to do whatever it takes to NOT be a slave to watering. The temperature was lower at that time and Erigeron glaucus 'Bountiful' took it all in stride soaking in one large drink at planting time and then subsisting on little to no water for the rest of the fall.

Growing only six to twelve inches tall by two feet wide, this picture of perfection with her rounded gray green leaves looks smashing at the front of the border. In my beach house garden (see right photo), I partnered her with two other west coast natives, Deschampsia cespitosa, or tufted hairgrass, and Sedum spathulifolium 'Carnea'. The silver foliage of the sedum takes on a light lavender hue and the color

echo with the erigeron flower rays is to die for. The nuances of this color combo make me swoon with delight! Erigeron glaucus 'Bountiful' or seaside fleabane is native



to the coastline of California and Oregon. A member of the Asteraceae family, this somewhat succulent free flowering knock-out is also deer tolerant but toxic to dogs and cats. Maintenance is minimal. Give Ms. Erigeron glaucus 'Bountiful' a haircut in midsummer if she starts looking a little peaked from working so hard. Water, then whisper sweet nothings into those little leaves. You'll be rewarded with more blooms, buzz from your pollinator friends, and beauty for your garden.

GCA's "C-Change Conversations" is a Dynamic Force in Climate Change Education

For those of you who were members in January 2018, you most likely attended the Iris Wagner Conservation Lecture at the Seattle Aquarium with guest speaker and founder of "C-Change Conversations," Kathleen Biggins. Shelley Rolfe and Barbie Snapp met Kathleen at NAL in February of 2017 and were delighted to secure her for our event. Under Kathleen's guidance, C-Change, a non-partisan educational outreach program highlighting how climate change impacts each of us, has continued to flourish. Barbie has kept up the connection the Kathleen through emails and the C-Change newsletter. Through Kathleen's tireless work with C-Change Conversations, she had the great honor of attending the annual international climate change conference: "COP 28 (Council of Parties) on Climate Change," a gathering of representatives from 197 nations held in Dubai, UAE. Once home from Dubai, Kathleen presented a zoom session to share what she learned from this enlightening experience. This was especially interesting as this COP took place in the heart of the MidEast oil-producing countries. While SGC has been focusing on our regional issues, Kathleen opens our eyes to climate challenges and solutions on a world scale. She points out the economic cost of climate change denial, demonstrating that recuperating from climate disasters is far more expensive than taking actions to mitigate carbon emissions.
