

A Force for Nature (https://www.bowenblair.com/) is an in-depth study of the path to having the Gorge declared a National Scenic Area in 1986 through the biography of Nancy, a woman with no political or organizing experience who mounted a national campaign with the help The Portland Garden Club, SCG, TCG and the GCA.

Rule #3: Photo Background – Dos and Don's! check for distractions and address issues - <u>details on page 3</u>

Rule #4: Sequence for shooting individual winners:

- Shoot a wide-angle image that includes entry, ribbon, award, and entry card.
- Shoot a close-up of just the entry.
- Shoot a close-up of the judges' comments.
- Shoot the winning entry with the entrant(s) if possible.

Rule #5 Candid Shots - Look for Action, Excitement and Emotion:

- Include Pre-Show activity- Set up, Passing, Preview Party, etc.
- Capture people looking at the exhibits.
- Make "Handing over Award" shots special!

Rule #8 Pay attention to photo quality:

• iPhone photos are best shot (not live) and sent in at full original size.

Megan's Corner

Maianthemum racemosum, The Perfect Plant? by Megan Smith

My dear husband just asked me which I loved more, him or my *Maianthemum racemosum*, a perennial otherwise known as false Solomon's seal. While it did make me pause for a moment, because this perennial is ALWAYS handsome in spring, summer and fall, my husband wins hands down because he's an evergreen, handsome in all four seasons. He edits my writing as well and makes a mean cocktail!

Maianthemum racemosum is a true winner! With its three-foot graceful, arching architectural form, ridged leaves, fragrant white panicle flowers, warm yellow fall color and red berries, it's a wonder this plant isn't in everyone's shade garden. As if looks weren't enough, this perennial is extremely low maintenance and adaptable as well. Drought tolerant and a polite colonizer, this perennial does not seek new real estate as much as the true Solomon's seal, or Polygonatum biflorum.





The *Maianthemum racemosum* flowers' nectar and pollen also feed our pollinator friends. Beetles, flies and bees of varying species adore this plant as do hummingbirds! Then, later in the fall, small mammals, bees and birds delight in the berries as a tasty food source. Discerning deer tend to exclude false Solomon's seal in their salad menu but will occasionally test a leaf or two.

This lovely plant has garnered major accolades! It has received the Royal Horticultural Society's prestigious "Award of Garden Merit" as well as The Garden Club of America's 2018 Freeman Medal Award runner up. It has cast its love throughout the United States by being indigenous to every state except Hawaii. So, with all these amazing features, one can only hope the *Maianthemum racemosum* doesn't turn evergreen, or else my dear husband better watch out!
